~ADDON (47) (Ad'don)

- Apparently an unidentified location in Babylonia, from which some returning to Jerusalem in 537 B.C.E, at the end of the 70-year desolation of Judah, were unable to establish their genealogy from the public records. As a consequence, they were disqualified from serving in the priesthood. Some scholars think Addon was an individual who was unable to prove his ancestry.
- And these were the one's going up from Tel-melah, Tel-harsha, Cherub, Addon and Immer, and they proved unable to tell the house of their fathers and their origin, whether they were of Israel. (Ezra 2:59)
- The sons of Delaiah, the sons of Tobiah, the sons of Nekoda, six hundred and fifty-two. (Ezra 2:60)
- And of the sons of the priests, the sons of Habaiah, the sons of Hakkoz, the sons of Barzillai, who took a wife from the daughters of Barzillai the Gileadite and came to be called by their name. (Ezra 2:61)
- These were the ones that looked for their register to establish their genealogy publicly, and they did not find themselves, so that they were barred as polluted from the priesthood. (Ezra 2:62)
- And these were the one's going up from Tel-melah, Tel-harsha, Cherub, Addon and Immer, and they were not able to tell the house of their fathers and their origin, whether they were of Israel: (Nehemiah 7:61)
- The sons of Delaiah, the sons of Tobiah, the sons of Nekoda, six hundred and forty-two. (Nehemiah 7:62)
- And of the priests, the sons of Habaiah, the sons of Hakkoz, the sons of Barzillai, who took a wife from the daughters of Barzillai the Gileadite and came to be called by their name. (Nehemiah 7:63)
- These were the ones that looked for their register, to establish

their genealogy publicly, and it was not found, so that they were barred as polluted from the priesthood. (Nehemiah 7:64)
