- Work produces advantage, but talk alone comes up short.
- By every kind of toil there comes to be an advantage, but merely the word of the lips tends to want. (Proverbs 14:23)
- Planning is to our advantage, but being hasty can cause us to lose our advantage.
- The plans of the diligent one surely make for advantage, but everyone that is hasty surely heads for want. (Proverbs 21:5)
- Solomon saw that there was no advantage under the Sun for all men die and lose their possessions.
- And I, even I, turned toward all the works of mine that my hands had done and toward the hard work that I had worked hard to accomplish, and, look! Everything was vanity and a striving after wind, and there was nothing of advantage under the sun. (Ecclesiastes 2:11)
- What advantage is there for the doer in what he is working hard at? (Ecclesiastes 3:9)
- Wisdom leads to advantage foolishness does not.
- And I saw, even I, that there exists more advantage for wisdom than for folly, just as there is more advantage for light than for darkness. (Ecclesiastes 2:13)
