~AMOS, BOOK OF (520)

... Highlights of Amos

- The prophecy of this Hebrew book of the Bible was directed primarily to the northern kingdom of Israel. Apparently it was first delivered orally during the reigns of Jeroboam II and Uzziah, kings of Israel and of Judah respectively, whose periods of kingship overlapped between 829 B.C.E. and about 804 B.C.E.
- The words of Amos, who happened to be among the sheep raisers from Tekoa, which he visioned concerning Israel in the days of Uzziah the king of Judah and in the days of Jeroboam the son of Joash, the king of Israel, two years before the earthquake. (Amos 1:1)
- By about 804 B.C.E. it was committed to writing, presumably after the prophet returned to Judah. For details about the prophet himself;

- The canonicity of this book, or its claim to a rightful place in the Bible, has never been questioned. From early times it has been accepted by the Jews, and it appears in the earliest Christian catalogs. Justin Martyr of the Second Century C.E. quoted from Amos in his Dialogue With Trypho, a Jew [Chapter XXII]. The book itself is in complete agreement with the rest of the Bible, as is shown by the writers many references to Bible history and the Laws of Moses.

- And I myself brought you people up out of the land of Egypt, and I kept making you walk through the wilderness forty years, in order to take possession of the land of the Amorite. (Amos 2:10)
- I caused an overthrow among you people, like God's overthrow of Sodom and Gomorrah. And you came to be like a log snatched out of the burning, but you did not come back to me, is the utterance of Yehowah. (Amos 4:11)
- But if you people offer up to me whole burnt offerings, even in your gift offerings I shall find no pleasure, and on your communion sacrifices of fatlings I shall not look. (Amos 5:22)
- Was it sacrifices and gift offerings that you people brought near to me in the wilderness for forty years, O house of Israel? (Amos 5:25)
- Saying; How long will it be before the new moon passes and we may sell cereals? Also, the Sabbath, and we may offer grain for sale, in order to make the ephah small and to make the shekel great and to falsify the scales of deception. (Amos 8:5)
- Christians of the First Century accepted the writings of Amos as inspired Scripture. For example, the martyr Stephen.
- So God turned and handed them over to render sacred service to the army of heaven, just as it is written in the book of the prophets: It was not to me that you offered victims and sacrifices for forty years in the wilderness, was it, O house of Israel? (Acts of Apostles 7:42)
- But it was the tent of Moloch and the star of the god Rephan that you took up, the figures which you made to worship them.

 Consequently I will deport you beyond Babylon. (Acts of Apostles 7:43)
- Was it sacrifices and gift offerings that you people brought near to me in the wilderness for forty years, O house of Israel? (Amos 5:25)
- And you will certainly carry Sakkuth your king and Kaiwan, your

images, the star of your god, whom you made for yourselves. (Amos 5:26)

- And I will cause you to go into exile beyond Damascus, he whose name is Yehowah the God of armies has said. (Amos 5:27)
- And James the half brother of Jesus,
- After they quit speaking, James answered, saying; Men, brothers, hear me. (Acts of Apostles 15:13)
- Symeon has related thoroughly how God for the first time turned his attention to the nations to take out of them a people for his name. (Acts of Apostles 15:14)
- And with this the words of the Prophets agree, just as it is written. (Acts of Apostles 15:15)
- After these things I shall return and rebuild the booth of David that is fallen down, and I shall rebuild its ruins and erect it again. (Acts of Apostles 15:16)
- In order, that those who remain of the men may earnestly seek Yehowah, together with people of all the nations, people who are called by my name, says Yehowah, who is doing these things. (Acts of Apostles 15:17)
- Known from of old. (Acts of Apostles 15:18)
- Hence my decision is not to trouble those from the nations who are turning to God. (Acts of Apostles 15:19)
- In that day I shall raise up the booth of David that is fallen, and I shall certainly repair their breaches. And its ruins I shall raise up, and I shall certainly build it up as in the days of long ago. (Amos 9:11)
- To the end that they may take possession of what is left remaining of Edom, and all the nations upon whom my name has been called, is the utterance of Yehowah, who is doing this. (Amos 9:12)
- Noted the fulfillment of some of the prophecies.

- Other historical events likewise attest to the truthfulness of the prophet. It is a matter of history that all the nations condemned by Amos were in due time devoured by the fire of destruction. The highly fortified city of Samaria itself was besieged and captured in 740 B.C.E, and the Assyrian army took the inhabitants into exile beyond Damascus, as foretold by Amos.
- And I will cause you to go into exile beyond Damascus, he whose name is Yehowah the God of armies has said. (Amos 5:27)
- And the king of Assyria proceeded to come up against all the land and to come up to Samaria and lay siege against it for three years. (2 Kings 17:5)
- In the ninth year of Hoshea, the king of Assyria captured Samaria and then led Israel into exile in Assyria and kept them dwelling in Halah and in Habor at the river Gozan and in the cities of the Medes. (2 Kings 17:6)
- Judah to the south likewise received her due punishment when she was destroyed in 607 B.C.E.
- And I will send a fire into Judah, and it must devour the dwelling towers of Jerusalem. (Amos 2:5)
- And true to Yehowah's word through Amos, captive descendants of both Israel and Judah returned in 537 B.C.E. to rebuild their homeland.
- And I will gather back the captive one's of my people Israel, and they will actually build the desolated cities and inhabit them, and plant vineyards and drink the wine of them, and make gardens and eat the fruit of them. (Amos 9:14)
- When the seventh month arrived the sons of Israel were in their cities. And the people began to gather themselves as one man to Jerusalem. (Ezra 3:1)
- Biblical archaeology also confirms that Amos was a truthful historian of his time, when, in describing the ostentatious luxury of the rich, he referred to their houses of ivory and couches of ivory.
- And I will strike down the winter house in addition to the summer house. And the houses of ivory will have to perish, and

- many houses will have to come to their finish, is the utterance of Yehowah. (Amos 3:15)
- You men that are lying down on couches of ivory and are sprawling on their divans, and are eating the rams out of a flock and the young bulls from among fattened calves. (Amos 6:4)
- Commenting on some of these findings, Jack Finegan states: It is of much interest that numerous ivories were found in the excavation of Samaria. These are mostly in the form of plaques or small panels in relief and presumably were once attached to furniture and inlaid in wall paneling. [Light From the Ancient Past, 1959, pp. 187,188]
- Yehowah's spirit moved Amos to employ simple, direct, picturesque language in a dignified manner befitting a prophet of God. Simple words, powerful words, words full of meaning, were chosen so both the high and the low could understand and get the sense of what he said. He used a variety of illustrations, some with rural flavor, to give vitality and force to his message.
- Here I am making what is under you sway, just as the wagon sways that is full up with a row of newly cut grain. (Amos 2:13)
- The Sovereign Lord Yehowah has sworn by his holiness, Look!
 There are days coming upon you, and he will certainly lift you up with butcher hooks and the last part of you with fishhooks.

 (Amos 4:2)
- For, look! I am commanding, and I will jiggle the house of Israel among all the nations, just as one jiggles the sieve, so that not a pebble falls to the earth. (Amos 9:9)
- Historical events are accurately recalled.
- This is what Yehowah has said; On account of three revolts of Tyre, and on account of four, I shall not turn it back, on account of their handing over a complete body of exiles to Edom, and because they did not remember the covenant of brothers. (Amos 1:9)
- This is what Yehowah has said; On account of three revolts of Edom, and on account of four, I shall not turn it back, on account of his pursuing his own brother with the sword, and because he ruined his own merciful qualities, and his anger keeps tearing

- · Allusions are made to familiar practices and customs of the people.
- And on garments seized as a pledge they stretch themselves out beside every altar, and the wine of those who have been fined they drink at the house of their gods. (Amos 2:8)
- You men that are lying down on couches of ivory and are sprawling on their divans, and are eating the rams out of a flock and the young bulls from among fattened calves. (Amos 6:4)
- That are improvising according to the sound of the stringed instrument, that, like David, have devised for themselves instruments for song. (Amos 6:5)
- That are drinking out of bowls of wine, and that with the choicest oils do their anointing, and that have not been made sick at the catastrophe of Joseph. (Amos 6:6)
- The whole is a well-ordered composition with definite form and purpose.
- As one of Yehowah's servants, Amos magnified the word and name, the righteousness, and the sovereignty of the Almighty. He describes how the Sovereign Lord, Yehowah of the armies, is infinitely great, that nothing is beyond His reach or power.
- If they dig down into Sheol, from there my own hand will take them, and if they go up to the heavens, from there I shall bring them down. (Amos 9:2)

- And if they hide themselves on the top of Carmel, from there I shall carefully search and be certain to take them. And if they conceal themselves from in front of my eyes on the floor of the sea, down there I shall command the serpent, and it must bite them. (Amos 9:3)

- In keeping with the meaning of his name, Amos bore a weighty message laden with woe and denunciation against the pagan nations as well as against Judah and Israel. He also carried a comforting message of restoration in which those faithful to Yehowah could put their hope.

- Hate what is bad, and love what is good, and give justice a place in the gate. It may be that Yehowah the God of armies will show favor to the remaining one's of Joseph. (Amos 5:15)
