## ~AYIN (36) (`a'yin)

- The 16th letter of the Hebrew alphabet. The Greek vowel o'mi-kron (o) is derived from 'a'yin. However, the Hebrew letter is not a vowel but a consonant. It represents a peculiar guttural sound pronounced at the back of the throat and has no equivalent in English. It is transliterated as `. It appears as the initial letter in each of the verses of Hebrew text.
- I have executed judgment and righteousness. O do not abandon me to those defrauding me! (Psalms 119:121)
- Act as a surety for your servant for what is good. May the presumptuous one's not defraud me. (Psalms 119:122)
