~BETHANY 2 (63) (Beth'a-ny)

- Bethany across the Jordan is mentioned but once;
- These things took place in **Bethany** across the Jordan, where John was baptizing. (John 1:28)
- As the place where John was baptizing and, apparently, where he identified Jesus to his disciples as the Lamb of God.
- Again the next day John was standing with two of his disciples. (John 1:35)
- And as he looked at Jesus walking he said; See, the Lamb of God! (John 1:36)
- In the third century Origen substituted the name Bethabara for Bethany, and the King James Version follows this rendering, however, the most reliable manuscripts read Bethany. The site of this Bethany beyond or East of the Jordan is unknown. Some, favoring the traditional location for Jesus baptism, would place it across the Jordan opposite Jericho. However, the record at;
- The next day he beheld Jesus coming toward him, and he said, See, the Lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world! (John 1:29)
- Again the next day John was standing with two of his disciples. (John 1:35)
- The next day he desired to depart for Galilee. So Jesus found Philip and said to him; Be my follower. (John 1:43)
- However, the record at;
- Now on the third day a marriage feast took place in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. (John 2:1)
- Seems to indicate a place no more than a day's journey from Cana of Galilee, while that of;

- So he went off again across the Jordan to the place where John was baptizing at first, and he stayed there. (John 10:40)
- Therefore his sisters dispatched word to him, saying; Lord, see! the one for whom you have affection is sick. (John 11:3)
- However, when he heard that he was sick, then he actually remained two days in the place where he was. (John 11:6)
- Consequently when Jesus arrived, he found he had already been four days in the memorial tomb. (John 11:17)
- May suggest that it lay about two days journey from the Bethany that was the home of Lazarus. Thus, a site somewhat South of the Sea of Galilee seems the most likely, but no positive identification is possible.
