[English, deceit, swindle, cheat, trick, fleece, take advantage of, dupe, con]

- To defraud was wrong under the Law. For instance to have a man do work under the promise of paying him money and then not to pay him according to your agreement was defrauding.
- In case a soul sins in that he does behave unfaithfully toward Yehowah and does deceive his associate about something in his charge or a deposit in hand or a robbery or he does defraud his associate. (Leviticus 6:2)
- You must not defraud your fellow, and you must not rob. The wages of a hired laborer should not stay all night with you until morning. (Leviticus 19:13)
- You must not defraud a hired laborer who is in trouble and poor, whether of your brothers or of your alien residents who are in your land, within your gates. (Deuteronomy 24:14)
- He did not allow anyone to defraud them, but on their account he reproved kings. (1 Chronicles 16:21)
- He did not allow any human to defraud them, but on their account he reproved kings. (Psalms 105:14)
- Act as a surety for your servant for what is good. May the presumptuous ones not defraud me. (Psalms 119:122)
- Defrauding through bad workmanship of false scales was also condemned
- As regards the tradesman, in his hand are the scales of deception, to defraud is what he has loved. (Hosea 12:7)
- Taking advantage of needy or poor ones who could not properly defend themselves was considered defrauding.
- And defraud no widow or fatherless boy, no alien resident or afflicted one, and scheme out nothing bad against one another in your hearts. (Zechariah 7:10)

- Jesus reiterated that defrauding was wrong for Christians.
- You know the commandments, Do not murder, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and mother. (Mark 10:19)
- Paul showed that those taking other to court were intent on defrauding them.
- To the contrary, you wrong and defraud, and your brothers at that. (1 Corinthians 6:8)
