## ~DERBE (84) (Der'be)

- A city of Lycaonia in Asia Minor, personally visited two times, or perhaps three, by the apostle Paul.
- Probably sometime prior to the winter of 47-48 C.E, during his first missionary journey, Paul arrived at Derbe after a severe stoning at nearby Lystra. At Derbe, he and Barnabas declared the Good News and made quite a few disciples, including, possibly, Gaius of Derbe, who is later mentioned as a traveling companion of the apostle.
- While secular history indicates that after 41 C.E. Derbe was the easternmost city of the political province of Galatia, Luke's description of it in this account as a city of Lycaonia is apparently in a regional or ethnographic sense.
- They, on being informed of it, fled to the cities of Lycaonia, Lystra and Derbe and the country round about. (Acts of Apostles 14:6)
- But Jews arrived from Antioch and Iconium and persuaded the crowds, and they stoned Paul and dragged him outside the city, imagining he was dead. (Acts of Apostles 14:19)
- However, when the disciples surrounded him, he rose up and entered into the city. And on the next day he left with Barnabas for Derbe. (Acts of Apostles 14:20)
- And after declaring the Good News to that city and making quite a few disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch. (Acts of Apostles 14:21)
- There were accompanying him Sopater the son of Pyrrhus of Beroea, Aristarchus and Secundus of the Thessalonians, and Gaius of Derbe, and Timothy, and from the district of Asia Tychicus and Trophimus. (Acts of Apostles 20:4)
- A number of months later, after the Jerusalem council concerning circumcision circa 49 C.E, and while on his second tour, Paul returned to Derbe.
- Now after some days Paul said to Barnabas; Above all things, let

us return and visit the brothers in every one of the cities in which we published the word of Yehowah to see how they are. (Acts of Apostles 15:36)

- So he arrived at Derbe and also at Lystra. And, look! A certain disciple was there by the name of Timothy, the son of a believing Jewish woman but of a Greek father. (Acts of Apostles 16:1)
- Though not singled out by name, **Derbe** may also have been a stop on Paul's third tour when he strengthened the disciples in the country of Galatia.
- And when he had passed some time there he departed and went from place to place through the country of Galatia and Phrygia, strengthening all the disciples. (Acts of Apostles 18:23)
- There is no record of Paul's meeting physical resistance at Derbe, and he makes no mention of the city many years later when recounting his sufferings at other places in its vicinity.
- My persecutions, my sufferings, the sort of things that happened to me in Antioch, in Iconium, in Lystra, the sort of persecutions I have borne, and yet out of them all the Lord delivered me. (2 Timothy 3:11)
- Derbe is possibly identified with Kerti Hüyük 21 kilometers (13 miles) North-northeast of Karaman or ancient Laranda, and about 100 kilometers (62 miles) Southeast of Konya or ancient Iconium. As to whether Derbe was included in Paul's letter addressed to the congregations of Galatia,
- And all the brothers with me, to the congregations of Galatia: (Galatians 1:2)
