[English, definitely, clearly, noticeably, markedly, particularly, specifically, conspicuously, manifestly, patently]

- The Israelites found a man gathering wood on a Sabbath and had no distinct precedent for dealing with him and so committed him to custody till one could be reached.
- So they committed him into custody, because it had not been distinctly stated what should be done to him. (Numbers 15:34)
- The official document that you have sent us has been distinctly read before me. (Ezra 4:18)
- When Jesus laid his hands upon a blind man then his sight was restored and he saw distinctly.
- Then he laid his hands again upon the man's eyes, and the man saw clearly, and he was restored, and he was seeing everything distinctly. (Mark 8:25)
