[English, upset, distraught, troubled, concerned, worried, anxious, unhappy, bothered, content]

- In the time of the judges the sons of Ammon would cross over the Jordan and cause distress to the Israelites.
- And the sons of Ammon would cross the Jordan to fight even against Judah and Benjamin and the house of Ephraim, and Israel was greatly distressed. (Judges 10:9)
- David was very distressed over the loss of Jonathan whom he dearly loved.
- I am distressed over you, my brother Jonathan, very pleasant you were to me. More wonderful was your love to me than the love from women. (2 Samuel 1:26)
- Daniel on seeing visions of God was greatly distressed because of them.
- As for me, Daniel, my spirit was distressed within on account of it, and the very visions of my head began to frighten me. (Daniel 7:15)
- The report about Jesus miraculous healings went out far and wide and they brought him people distressed with various diseases.
- And the report about him went out into all Syria, and they brought him all those faring badly, distressed with various diseases and torments, demon-possessed and epileptic and paralyzed persons, and he cured them. (Matthew 4:24)
- After getting up out of the synagogue he entered into Simon's home. Now Simon's mother-in-law was distressed with a high fever, and they made request of him for her. (Luke 4:38)
- Jesus baptism into death was a course to which he was firmly committed and he was distressed until he should complete it.
- Indeed, I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and how I am being distressed until it is finished! (Luke 12:50)

- The father of Publius was distressed with fever and dysentery when Paul came in and healed him.
- But it happened that the father of Publius was lying down distressed with fever and dysentery, and Paul went in to him and prayed, laid his hands upon him and healed him. (Acts of Apostles 28:8)
- Righteous Lot was greatly distressed by the indulgence of the law-defying people in loose conduct.
- And he delivered righteous Lot, who was greatly distressed by the indulgence of the law-defying people in loose conduct. (2 Peter 2:7)
