~DISTRESS (710)

[English, suffering, pain, sorrow, anguish, agony, grief, misery, Opposite of, peace]

- Jacob wanted to go up to Bethel to make an altar to the God who answered him in his distress.
- And let us rise and go up to Bethel. And there I shall make an altar to the true God who answered me in the day of my distress in that he proved to be with me in the way that I have gone. (Genesis 35:3)
- Joseph's brothers felt guilt for this treatment of Joseph when he had pleaded with them for compassion in his distress.
- And they began to say one to the other; Unquestionably we are guilty with regard to our brother, because we saw the distress of his soul when he implored compassion on our part, but we did not listen. That is why this distress has come upon us. (Genesis 42:21)
- Yehowah sent his people back to their false idol gods to save them, when they came to be in distress.
- Go and call for aid to the gods whom you have chosen. Let them be the ones to save you in the time of your distress. (Judges 10:14)
- Jephthah asked the men of Gilead why they now turned to him to help them out of distress.
- But Jephthah said to the older men of Gilead; Was it not you that hated me so that you drove me out of my father's house? And why is it that you have come to me now just when you are in distress? (Judges 11:7)
- David told Saul that just as he magnified the king, by not bringing harm to him, so likewise he asked Saul to deliver him out of all his distress.
- And, look! Just as your soul was great this day in my eyes, so may my soul be great in the eyes of Yehowah, that he may

deliver me out of all distress. (1 Samuel 26:24)

- David swore by Yehowah God as the one who delivered him out of all his distress.
- However, David answered Rechab and Baanah his brother, the sons of Rimmon the Beerothite, and said to them; As Yehowah who redeemed my soul out of all distress is living. (2 Samuel 4:9)
- And the king proceeded to swear and say; As Yehowah is living who redeemed my soul out of all distress. (1 Kings 1:29)
- Hezekiah saw the advance of Assyria against his city as a day of distress and of rebuke and of scornful insolence, begging Yehowah God to rescue his people Israel.
- And they proceeded to say to him; This is what Hezekiah has said; This day is a day of distress and of rebuke and of scornful insolence, for the sons have come as far as the wombs mouth, and there is no power to give birth. (2 Kings 19:3)
- When Israel turned in true repentance to Yehowah their God in their distress, then he let himself be found by them.
- But when in their distress they returned to Yehowah the God of Israel and looked for him, then he let himself be found by them. (2 Chronicles 15:4)
- Yehowah God kept the people in disorder with every kind of distress.
- And they were crushed to pieces, nation against nation and city against city, because God himself kept them in disorder with every sort of distress. (2 Chronicles 15:6)
- Jehoshaphat called to Yehowah God for aid when his people came to be in distress.
- If there should come upon us calamity, sword, adverse judgment, or pestilence or famine, let us stand before this house and before you, for your name is in this house, that we may call to you for aid out of our distress, and may you hear and save. (2 Chronicles 20:9)

- Tilgath-pilneser caused Ahaz distress, and did not strengthen him, due to his unfaithful actions against Yehowah God.
- Eventually Tilgath-pilneser the king of Assyria came against him and caused him distress, and did not strengthen him. (2 Chronicles 28:20)
- However, at the time that he was causing him distress, he acted unfaithfully still more toward Yehowah, that is, King Ahaz did. (2 Chronicles 28:22)
- Manasseh rebelled against Yehowah God but as soon as Yehowah caused him distress he humbled himself.
- And as soon as it caused him distress, he softened the face of Yehowah his God and kept humbling himself greatly because of the God of his forefathers. (2 Chronicles 33:12)
- Yehowah God gave his people into the hands of their enemies when they were unfaithful who caused them distress.
- For this you gave them into the hand of their adversaries, who kept causing them distress, but in the time of their distress they would cry out to you, and you yourself would hear from the very heavens, and in accord with your abundant mercy you would give them saviors who would save them out of the hand of their adversaries. (Nehemiah 9:27)
- And its produce is abounding for the kings that you have put over us because of our sins, and over our bodies they are ruling and over our domestic animals, according to their liking, and we are in great distress. (Nehemiah 9:37)
- Esther pleaded with the king in her distress over a law passed against her people Israel.
- For we have been sold, I and my people, to be annihilated, killed and destroyed. Now if we had been sold for mere men slaves and for mere maidservants, I should have kept silent. But the distress is not appropriate when with damage to the king. (Esther 7:4)
- Job showed that he would answer in the distress of his spirit.

- I, also, I shall not hold back my mouth. I will speak in the distress of my spirit. I will be concerned with the bitterness of my soul! (Job 7:11)
- Job showed that distress and anguish keep terrifying the wicked ones.
- Distress and anguish keep terrifying him, they overpower him like a king in readiness for the assault. (Job 15:24)
- Job asked if Yehowah would hear an outcry from the wicked one in case his distress comes upon him.
- Will God hear an outcry of his in case distress comes upon him?
 (Job 27:9)
- Yehowah God will rescue the afflicted one from the mouth of distress.
- And he will also certainly allure you from the mouth of distress!

 Broader space, not constraint, will be in its place, and the consolation of your table will be full of fatness. (Job 36:16)
- Yehowah holds ready the snow storm and hail as a means of causing distress in the war, and in the fight.
- Which I have kept back for the time of distress, for the day of fight and war? (Job 38:23)
- The Psalmist asked for Yehowah God to answer him in his distress and make a broad space for him.
- When I call, answer me, O my righteous God. In the distress you must make broad space for me. Show me favor and hear my prayer. (Psalms 4:1)
- Yehowah God will become a secure height for anyone crushed in his time of distress.
- And Yehowah will become a secure height for anyone crushed, a secure height in times of distress. (Psalms 9:9)
- The Psalmist asked Yehowah God why he kept himself far off in the time of distress, and hidden.

- Why, O Yehowah, do you keep standing afar off? Why do you keep yourself hid in times of distress? (Psalms 10:1)
- The Psalmist showed how Yehowah God's Messiah would feel in his time of distress.
- In my distress I kept calling upon Yehowah, and to my God I kept crying for help. Out of his temple he proceeded to hear my voice, and my own cry before him for help now came into his ears. (Psalms 18:6)
- The Psalmist asked that Yehowah God would protect a man in his day of distress.
- May Yehowah answer you in the day of distress. May the name of the God of Jacob protect you. (Psalms 20:1)
- The Psalmist asked Yehowah God to stay close to him, for distress was nearby.
- Do not keep far off from me, because distress is nearby, because there is no other helper. (Psalms 22:11)
- The Psalmist saw Yehowah God as a concealment place for him from distress.
- You are a place of concealment for me. You will safeguard me from distress itself. With joyful cries at providing escape you will surround me. (Psalms 32:7)
- The salvation of the righteous ones is from Yehowah God, for he is a fortress for them in distress.
- And the salvation of the righteous ones is from Yehowah, he is their fortress in the time of distress. (Psalms 37:39)
- And call me in the day of distress. I shall rescue you, and you will glorify me. (Psalms 50:15)
- For out of every distress he delivered me, and upon my enemies my eye has looked. (Psalms 54:7)

- To the Psalmist Yehowah God proved to be a secure height, and a place in which to flee, in the time of distress.
- But as for me, I shall sing of your strength, and in the morning I shall joyfully tell about your loving-kindness. For you have proved to be a secure height for me and a place to which to flee in the day of my distress. (Psalms 59:16)
- The Psalmist knew that Yehowah God alone is a place to flee to in distress, as salvation by earthling man was worthless.
- Do give us assistance from distress, as salvation by earthling man is worthless. (Psalms 60:11)
- In his day of distress, the Psalmist searched for Yehowah God himself.
- In the day of my distress I have searched for Yehowah himself.

 At night my very hand has been stretched out and does not grow numb, my soul has refused to be comforted. (Psalms 77:2)
- The Psalmist showed, that Yehowah God sends denunciation and distress to his enemies through deputations of angels.
- He went sending upon them his burning anger, fury and denunciation and distress, deputations of angels bringing calamity. (Psalms 78:49)
- In distress Yehowah God's Messiah called to him, and he answered him, in the concealed place of thunder.
- In distress you called, and I proceeded to rescue you. I began to answer you in the concealed place of thunder. I went examining you at the waters of Meribah. (Psalms 81:7)
- The Psalmist showed that in the day of distress he would call to his God Yehowah.
- In the day of my distress I will call upon you, for you will answer me. (Psalms 86:7)
- The Psalmist prophesied that Yehowah God's Messiah would call to him, and that he would rescue him from distress and glorify him.

- He will call upon me, and I shall answer him. I shall be with him in distress. I shall rescue him and glorify him. (Psalms 91:15)
- Yehowah God sees the distress of his people, and hears their entreating cries, and he saves them.
- And he would see the distress of theirs when he heard their entreating cry. (Psalms 106:44)
- And they kept crying out to Yehowah in their distress, out of the stresses upon them he proceeded to deliver them. (Psalms 107:6)
- And they began calling to Yehowah for help in their distress, out of the stresses upon them he as usual saved them. (Psalms 107:13)
- And they began calling to Yehowah for help in their distress, out of the stresses upon them he as usual saved them. (Psalms 107:19)
- And they begin crying out to Yehowah in their distress, and out of the stresses upon them he brings them forth. (Psalms 107:28)
- Do give us assistance from distress, as salvation by earthling man is worthless. (Psalms 108:12)
- The Psalmist shows, how the Messiah felt as he approached death, where distress and grief kept finding him.
- The ropes of death encircled me and the distressing circumstances of Sheol themselves found me. Distress and grief I kept finding. (Psalms 116:3)
- Yet through this ordeal he was sustained by his father's word, for this is what he was fond of.
- Distress and difficulty themselves found me. Your commandments I was fond of. (Psalms 119:143)
- To Yehowah I called in the distress of mine, and he proceeded to answer me. (Psalms 120:1)
- If I should walk in the midst of distress, you will preserve me

alive. Because of the anger of my enemies you will thrust out your hand, and your right hand will save me. (Psalms 138:7)

- The Psalmist asked for Yehowah God to preserve him alive out of all his distress.
- For the sake of your name, O Yehowah, may you preserve me alive. In your righteousness may you bring forth my soul out of distress. (Psalms 143:11)
- Yehowah God promises to laugh at the disaster and distress, of those who ignore his way.
- When what you dread comes just like a storm, and your own disaster gets here just like a storm wind, when distress and hard times come upon you. (Proverbs 1:27)
- The righteous one is the one rescued from distress, and the wicked one takes his place there.
- The righteous is the one rescued even from distress, and the wicked one comes in instead of him. (Proverbs 11:8)
- A bad person's lips ensnare him, but the righteous ones gets out of his distress.
- By the transgression of the lips the bad person is ensnared, but the righteous one gets out of distress. (Proverbs 12:13)
- A true companion is a brother that is born for the day of distress.
- A true companion is loving all the time, and is a brother that is born for when there is distress. (Proverbs 17:17)
- A man who is discouraged in the day of distress will be lacking in power.
- Have you shown yourself discouraged in the day of distress? Your power will be scanty. (Proverbs 24:10)
- A man proving treacherous in the day of distress, is like a wobbling foot or a broken tooth.
- As a broken tooth and a wobbling foot is the confidence in one

proving treacherous in the day of distress. (Proverbs 25:19)

- Isaiah prophesied distress and hard times for the earth, gloominess with no brightness.
- And to the earth he will look, and, lo! Distress and darkness, obscurity, hard times and gloominess with no brightness. (Isaiah 8:22)
- Isaiah prophesied that Yehowah God would prove to be a stronghold for the lowly one in his distress.
- For you have become a stronghold to the lowly one, a stronghold to the poor one in the distress that he has, a refuge from the rainstorm, a shade from the heat, when the blast of the tyrannical ones is like a rainstorm against a wall. (Isaiah 25:4)
- Isaiah showed, that Yehowah God's people would turn to him and pour out a whisper of prayer during their distress.
- O Yehowah, during distress they have turned their attention to you, they have poured out a whisper of prayer when they had your disciplining. (Isaiah 26:16)
- The beasts of the south, today represent beastlike rulers of this system of things, the greater Egypt. They lead people through a very difficult and stressful way, but to the people of the world they have proved to be of no benefit. Their system with all of its many resources, will be of no benefit to them, in the day of Yehowah's fury. They will not be able to hold it back.

The pronouncement against the beasts of the south. Through the land of distress and hard conditions, of the lion and the leopard growling, of the viper and the flying fiery snake, on the shoulders of full-grown asses they carry their resources, and on the humps of camels their supplies. In behalf of the people they will prove of no benefit. (Isaiah 30:6)

- Isaiah promised a time when Yehowah God would give his people discipline in the form of distress, and water in the form of oppression, Yehowah promised then he would not hide himself from them.
- And Yehowah will certainly give you people bread in the form of

distress and water in the form of oppression, yet your Grand Instructor will no longer hide himself, and your eyes must become eyes seeing your Grand Instructor. (Isaiah 30:20)

- Isaiah pleaded with Yehowah God to become his people's arm every morning, and their salvation in time of distress.
- O Yehowah, show us favor. In you we have hoped. Become our arm every morning, yes, our salvation in the time of distress. (Isaiah 33:2)
- Hezekiah showed that the advance of the Assyrians into Judah was a day of distress, and scornful insolence against Yehowah God.
- And they proceeded to say to him; This is what Hezekiah has said; This day is a day of distress and of rebuke and of scornful insolence, for the sons have come as far as the wombs mouth, and there is no power to give birth. (Isaiah 37:3)
- Idols cannot do anything for those in distress, for they cannot even stand up on their own.
- They carry it upon the shoulder, they bear it and deposit it in its place that it may stand still. From its standing place it does not move away. One even cries out to it, but it does not answer, out of one's distress it does not save one. (Isaiah 46:7)
- During all of the distresses that Israel endured, it was distressing to Yehowah God, and so in his love he repurchased them.
- During all their distress it was distressing to him. And his own personal messenger saved them. In his love and in his compassion he himself repurchased them, and he proceeded to lift them up and carry them all the days of long ago. (Isaiah 63:9)
- Isaiah showed that he had heard a voice like that of a woman giving birth to her first child in distress, the daughter of Zion who keeps gasping for breath, because of the badness all around her.
- For a voice like that of a sick woman I have heard, the distress like that of a woman giving birth to her first child, the voice of the daughter of Zion who keeps gasping for breath. She keeps spreading out her palms; Woe, now, to me, for my soul is tired of the killers! (Jeremiah 4:31)

- Distress seized the people of Jerusalem when they heard the report of the advancing armies of Babylon.
- We have heard the report about it. Our hands have dropped.
 Distress itself has seized hold of us, labor pains like those of a woman giving birth. (Jeremiah 6:24)
- Jeremiah showed that Yehowah God would bring distress to the inhabitants of the earth, in order that they may find out.
- For this is what Yehowah has said; Here I am slinging out the inhabitants of the earth on this occasion, and I will cause them distress in order, that they may find out. (Jeremiah 10:18)
- Jeremiah calls Yehowah God the savior of Israel in the time of her distress.
- O you the hope of Israel, the Savior of him in the time of distress, why do you become like an alien resident in the land, and like a traveler that has turned aside to spend the night? (Jeremiah 14:8)
- The Jeremiah Yehowah God promised to intercede for his people in their time of distress.
- Yehowah has said; Surely I will minister to you for good. Surely I will intercede for you in the time of calamity and in the time of distress, against the enemy. (Jeremiah 15:11)
- Jeremiah saw Yehowah God as a place to flee to in time of distress.
- O Yehowah my strength and my stronghold, and my place for flight in the day of distress, to you the nations themselves will come from the ends of the earth, and they will say; Indeed our forefathers came to possess sheer falsehood, vanity and things in which there was nothing beneficial. (Jeremiah 16:19)
- Yehowah God's great Day will be a great one, and it will be a time of distress for Jacob.
- Alas! For that day is a great one, so that there is no other like it, and it is the time of distress for Jacob. But he will be saved even

out of it. (Jeremiah 30:7)

- The men of Moab will become like the heart of a wife in childbirth distress, when her day of judgment comes.
- The towns will actually be captured, and her own strong places will certainly be seized. And the heart of the mighty men of Moab must become in that day like the heart of a wife having childbirth distress. (Jeremiah 48:41)
- When Yehowah God's judgment comes against Bozrah, her mighty men will come to have hearts like a woman in childbirth distress.
- Look! Just like an eagle someone will ascend and pounce down, and he will spread out his wings over Bozrah, and the heart of the mighty men of Edom will actually become in that day like the heart of the wife having distress in childbirth. (Jeremiah 49:22)
- Damascus likewise will suffer distress like childbirth pains, and she will flee and lose courage then.
- Damascus has lost courage. She has turned to flee, and sheer panic has seized her. Distress and birth pangs themselves have taken hold of her, as with a woman that is giving birth. (Jeremiah 49:24)
- Later also the king of Babylon, Belshazzar felt distress, and made no fight against the forces that quickly captured his city, and brought distress upon it.
- The king of Babylon has heard the report about them, and his hands have dropped down. There is distress! Severe pains have seized hold of him, just like a woman giving birth. (Jeremiah 50:43)
- In the time of the end, Michael will stand up, and a great time of distress will ensue, worse than any distress coming before that time.
- And during that time Michael will stand up, the great prince who is standing in behalf of the sons of your people. And there will certainly occur a time of distress such as has not been made to occur since there came to be a nation until that time. And during that time your people will escape, every one who is found written

down in the book. (Daniel 12:1)

- Obadiah told Edom not to watch in the day of distress coming upon Judah, not to cut off escape for Judah's survivors from their enemies.
- And you ought not to watch the sight in the day of your brother, in the day of his misfortune, and you ought not to rejoice at the sons of Judah in the day of their perishing, and you ought not to maintain a big mouth in the day of their distress. (Obadiah 1:12)
- And you ought not to stand at the parting of the ways, in order to cut off his escapees, and you ought not to hand over his survivors in the day of distress. (Obadiah 1:14)
- Yehowah God is good, and he is a stronghold in the day of distress, ever aware of those seeking refuge in him.
- Yehowah is good, a stronghold in the day of distress. And he is cognizant of those seeking refuge in him. (Nahum 1:7)
- Nahum asked the men of Nineveh what they felt they could do to defend themselves against Yehowah God the almighty, for once he brought distress against them, he would not need to repeat it.
- What will you men think up against Yehowah? He is causing an outright extermination. Distress will not rise up a second time.
 (Nahum 1:9)
- Habakkuk decided to quietly wait for the day of Yehowah, the day of distress, for his coming up to the people to raid them.
- I heard, and my belly began to be agitated, at the sound my lips quivered. Rottenness began to enter into my bones, and in my situation I was agitated, that I should quietly wait for the day of distress, for his coming up to the people, that he may raid them. (Habakkuk 3:16)
- Yehowah God's great Day is a day of distress and of anguish, when men will walk like blind men, and their blood will be poured out like dust on the ground.
- That day is a day of fury, a day of distress and of anguish, a day of storm and of desolation, a day of darkness and of gloominess,

- a day of clouds and of thick gloom. (Zephaniah 1:15)
- And I will cause distress to mankind, and they will certainly walk like blind men, because it is against Yehowah that they have sinned. And their blood will actually be poured out like dust, and their bowels like the dung. (Zephaniah 1:17)
- Yehowah God would bring distress upon Assyria and Egypt.
- And he must pass through the sea with distress, and in the sea he must strike down the waves, and all the depths of the Nile must dry up. And the pride of Assyria must be brought down, and the very scepter of Egypt will depart. (Zechariah 10:11)
- Jesus showed that the world wars, food shortages, pestilences and earthquakes, were only a beginning of the pangs of distress, indicating the conclusion of the system of things.
- All these things are a beginning of pangs of distress. (Matthew 24:8)
- For nation will rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom, there will be earthquakes in one place after another, there will be food shortages. These are a beginning of pangs of distress. (Mark 13:8)
- Jesus caused mental distress to his parents when he stayed at the temple in Jerusalem when they departed for home.
- Now when they saw him they were astounded, and his mother said to him; Child, why did you treat us this way? Here your father and I in mental distress have been looking for you. (Luke 2:48)
- Jesus foretold a time of great distress for the people of Jerusalem, when enemies would distress them from every side in a siege of war.
- Because the days will come upon you when your enemies will build around you a fortification with pointed stakes and will encircle you and distress you from every side. (Luke 19:43)

- Paul showed the Romans that tribulation and distress would come upon every person working what is injurious, upon the Jew first, and also upon the Greek.
- Tribulation and distress, upon the soul of every man who works what is injurious, of the Jew first and also of the Greek. (Romans 2:9)
- Paul showed that neither, persecution, distress, tribulation, hunger or sword could separate spirit anointed Christians from the love of Christ.
- Who will separate us from the love of the Christ? Will tribulation or distress or persecution or hunger or nakedness or danger or sword? (Romans 8:35)
- Just when men are saying peace and security, then sudden destruction will be upon them like the pangs of distress upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape.
- Whenever it is that they are saying; Peace and security! Then sudden destruction is to be instantly upon them just as the pang of distress upon a pregnant woman, and they will by no means escape. (1 Thessalonians 5:3)
