## ~DOR (77)

- One of the Palestinian cities that allied with Canaanite King Jabin of Hazor to fight against Joshua.
- And it came about that as soon as Jabin the king of Hazor heard of it, he went sending to Jobab the king of Madon and to the king of Shimron and the king of Achshaph. (Joshua 11:1)
- And to the kings that were to the north in the mountainous region and in the desert plains south of Chinnereth and in the Shephelah and on the mountain ridges of Dor to the west. (Joshua 11:2)
- Was summarily defeated.
- And all the cities of these kings and all their kings Joshua captured and went striking them with the edge of the sword. He devoted them to destruction, just as Moses the servant of Yehowah had commanded. (Joshua 11:12)
- The king of **Dor** on the mountain ridge of **Dor**, one, the king of Goilm in Gilgal, one. (**Joshua 12:23**)
- Though Dor and its dependent towns actually lay in Asher's territory, these were given to the tribe of Manasseh, who proved unable to dispossess the inhabitants remaining there.
- And there came to belong to Manasseh in Issachar and in Asher Beth-shean and its dependent towns and Ibleam and its dependent towns and the inhabitants of Dor and its dependent towns and the inhabitants of En-dor and its dependent towns and the inhabitants of Taanach and its dependent towns and the inhabitants of Megiddo and its dependent towns, three of the heights. (Joshua 17:11)
- And the sons of Manasseh did not prove able to take possession of these cities, but the Canaanites persisted in dwelling in this land. (Joshua 17:12)
- And it turned out that when the sons of Israel had grown strong, they went putting the Canaanites at forced labor, and they did

not dispossess them entirely. (Joshua 17:13)

- And by the side of the sons of Manasseh Beth-shean and its dependent towns, Taanach and its dependent towns, Megiddo and its dependent towns, Dor and its dependent towns. In these the sons of Joseph the son of Israel dwelt. (1 Chronicles 7:29)
- Later the territory of Dor, overseen by one of Solomon's sons-inlaw, provided food one month out of the year for the king's household.
- The son of Abinadab, all the mountain ridge of Dor, Taphath, Solomon's daughter, herself became his wife. (1 Kings 4:11)
- The city of **Dor** is usually identified with **Khirbet el-Burj**, **Tel Dor**, 13 kilometers (8 miles) North of Caesarea, on the long narrow coastal plain stretching along the Mediterranean Sea. This location on the coastal plain has caused some discussion as to the meaning of the frequently used phrase the mountain ridges from the Hebrew *na-phah'* of **Dor**.
- And to the kings that were to the north in the mountainous region and in the desert plains south of Chinnereth and in the Shephelah and on the mountain ridges of Dor to the west. (Joshua 11:2)
- Some scholars believe this refers to the cliffs that line much of the coast in this region, thus associating the Hebrew *na-phah'* with the Arabic term *nafnaf*, meaning cliff, precipice. Others believe it may indicate the hilly slopes that begin 3 kilometers (2 miles) inland from Dor and culminate in the heights of Mount Carmel.
