

~ENTREAT (155)

[English, plead, implore, beg, pray, beseech, ask, request]

- Pharaoh called Moses and Aaron and asked them to **entreat** Yehowah God to remove the frogs from his land.
- In time Pharaoh called Moses and Aaron and said; **Entreat** Yehowah that he may remove the frogs from me and my people, as I want to send the people away that they may sacrifice to Yehowah. (**Exodus 8:8**)
- Then later also with the hail, he **entreated** Yehowah God.
- **Entreat** Yehowah that this may be enough of the occurring of God's thunders and hail. Then I am willing to send you away, and you will not stay any longer. (**Exodus 9:28**)
- And now pardon, please, my sin just this once and entreat Yehowah your God that he may turn away just this deadly plague from upon me. (**Exodus 10:17**)
- Manoah **entreated** Yehowah God to let the angel return to assist him and his wife.
- And Manoah began to **entreat** Yehowah and say; Excuse me, Yehowah. The man of the true God that you just sent, let him, please, come again to us and instruct us as to what we ought to do to the child that will be born. (**Judges 13:8**)
- The legion of demons **entreated** Jesus to let them go off into a herd of swine.
- So the demons began to **entreat** him, saying; If you expel us, send us forth into the herd of swine. (**Matthew 8:31**)
- In Jesus' parable, the fellow slave of the one forgiven much, **entreated** his fellow slave to forgive him his debt, or be patient with him, until he could repay it.
- Therefore his fellow slave fell down and began to **entreat** him, saying; Be patient with me and I will pay you back. (**Matthew 18:29**)

- After Jesus removed the legion of demons from two men, the men of that region **entreated** Jesus to leave their territory.
- And so they started to **entreat** him to go away from their districts. (**Mark 5:17**)
- Jews **entreated** Jesus to help a man who assisted the Jews often, saying that he was worthy of his help.
- Then those that came up to Jesus began to **entreat** him earnestly, saying; He is worthy of your conferring this upon him. (**Luke 7:4**)
- Jarius **entreated** Jesus, falling down at his feet in behalf of his daughter, who was dying.
- But, look! A man named Jairus came, and this man was a presiding officer of the synagogue. And he fell at the feet of Jesus and began to **entreat** him to enter into his house. (**Luke 8:41**)
- The father of the prodigal son **entreated** his older son to come in and join in the happy celebration, but he was unwilling.
- But he became wrathful and was unwilling to go in. Then his father came out and began to **entreat** him. (**Luke 15:28**)
- The disciples in Joppa **entreated** Peter to come to their city when he was ministering nearby.
- Now as Lydda was near Joppa, when the disciples heard that Peter was in this city they dispatched two men to him to **entreat** him; Please do not hesitate to come on as far as us. (**Acts of Apostles 9:38**)
- The Jews gave false information to Festus, and **entreated** him to take action against Paul.
- And the chief priests and the principal men of the Jews gave him information against Paul. So they began to **entreat** him. (**Acts of Apostles 25:2**)

- Paul **entreated** his Christian brothers by the compassions of God, to present to God their bodies as a living sacrifice, through their power of reason.
- Consequently I **entreat** you by the compassions of God, brothers, to present your bodies a sacrifice living, holy, acceptable to God, a sacred service with your power of reason. (**Romans 12:1**)
- Paul showed, that when he was being defamed by others, that he **entreated** them, even though they viewed him as garbage and as an offscouring.
- When being defamed, we **entreat**, we have become as the refuse of the world, the offscouring of all things, until now. (**1 Corinthians 4:13**)
- Paul **entreated** his spirit anointed Christian brothers to imitate him, as a fine example of faith.
- I **entreat** you, therefore, become imitators of me. (**1 Corinthians 4:16**)
- Paul, as a coworker with Christ, entreated his spirit anointed Christian brothers not to accept the undeserved-kindness of God and then miss its purpose.
- Working together with him, we also **entreat** you not to accept the undeserved kindness of God and miss its purpose. (**2 Corinthians 6:1**)
- Paul **entreated** his spirit anointed Christian brothers with mildness and kindness like that of Christ's.
- Now I myself, Paul, **entreat** you by the mildness and kindness of the Christ, lowly though I am in appearance among you, whereas when absent I am bold toward you. (**2 Corinthians 10:1**)
- Paul as a prisoner of the Lord, **entreated** his spirit anointed Christian brothers to walk worthily of the holy calling they were called to, intimacy with God and Christ.
- I, therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, **entreat** you to walk worthily of the calling with which you were called. (**Ephesians 4:1**)

- **Paul showed that it was not proper for Timothy to criticize an older man, but for Timothy to entreat him as a father.**
- **Do not severely criticize an older man. To the contrary, **entreat** him as a father, younger men as brothers. (1 Timothy 5:1)**
