~FURLONG (31)
[Greek, sta'di-on]

- The Greek word Greek, sta'di-on thus translated denotes a linear measure equal to 185 meters ( 625 Roman feet)(606.75 English feet) or 1/8 Roman mile. (The Roman mile equals $\mathbf{1 , 4 7 9 . 5}$ meters)(4,854 feet.)
- And the winepress was trodden outside the city, and blood came out of the winepress as high up as the bridles of the horses, for a distance of a thousand six hundred furlongs. (Revelation 14:20)
- And the city lies foursquare, and its length is as great as its breadth. And he measured the city with the reed, twelve thousand furlongs, its length and breadth and height are equal. (Revelation 21:16)
- This is the approximate length of both the Attic and the Roman stadium. This is different from the modern furlong of 201 meters (660 feet). At;
- Do you not know that the runners in a race all run, but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may attain it. (1 Corinthians 9:24)
- The term sta'di-on, stadium, is rendered race, the length of the Greek racecourse being one stadium. The stadium of the Olympic course, however, was actually 192 meters (630 feet)
