- That noble and warmhearted readiness to bless others by freely giving out of an open hand, unstintingly. The Hebrew word *na-dhiv'*, rendered generous in;
- As regards the generous one, it is for generous things that he has given counsel, and in favor of generous things he himself will rise up. (Isaiah 32:8)

- But I am afraid that somehow, as the serpent seduced Eve by its cunning, your minds might be corrupted away from the sincerity and the chastity that are due the Christ. (2 Corinthians 11:3)
- Yehowah himself is the personification of **generosity**, the One who fully supplies all the needs of his obedient creatures according to his will.
- And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that, no matter what it is that we ask according to his will, he hears us. (1 John 5:14)
- In turn, my God will fully supply all your need to the extent of his riches in glory by means of Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:19)
- Every good gift and perfect present is from him, including such an intangible gift as wisdom.
- So, if any one of you is lacking in wisdom, let him keep on asking God, for he gives generously to all and without reproaching, and it will be given him. (James 1:5)
- Every good gift and every perfect present is from above, for it comes down from the Father of the celestial lights, and with him there is not a variation of the turning of the shadow. (James 1:17)
- Moses urged his fellow Israelites to cultivate this divine quality of generosity, even when making a loan on pledge. You must not harden your heart or be closefisted toward your poor brother.
- For you should **generously** open your hand to him. You should by all means give to him, and your heart should not be stingy in your giving to him. That is why I am commanding you, saying; You should generously open up your hand to your afflicted and poor brother in your land.
- In case some one of your brothers becomes poor among you in

one of your cities, in your land that Yehowah your God is giving you, you must not harden your heart or be closefisted toward your poor brother. (Deuteronomy 15:7)

- For you should generously open your hand to him and by all means lend him on pledge as much as he needs, which he is in want of. (Deuteronomy 15:8)
- Watch out for yourself for fear a base word should come to be in your heart, saying; The seventh year, the year of the release, has come close, and your eye should indeed become ungenerous toward your poor brother, and you should give him nothing, and he has to call out to Yehowah against you, and it has become a sin on your part. (Deuteronomy 15:9)
- You should by all means give to him, and your heart should not be stingy in your giving to him, because on this account Yehowah your God will bless you in every deed of yours and in every undertaking of yours. (Deuteronomy 15:10)
- For someone poor will never cease to be in the midst of the land. That is why I am commanding you, saying; You should generously open up your hand to your afflicted and poor brother in your land. (Deuteronomy 15:11)

- Jesus Christ expressed it this way; There is more happiness in giving than there is in receiving.
- I have exhibited to you in all things that by thus laboring you must assist those who are weak, and must bear in mind the words of the Lord Jesus, when he himself said; There is more happiness in giving than there is in receiving. (Acts of Apostles 20:35)
- Again he said; Practice giving, and people will give to you. They will pour into your laps a fine measure, pressed down, shaken together and overflowing. For with the measure that you are measuring out, they will measure out to you in return.

- God, moreover, is able to make all his undeserved kindness abound toward you, that, while you always have full self-sufficiency in everything, you may have plenty for every good work. (2 Corinthians 9:8)
- Just as it is written: He has distributed widely, he has given to the poor ones, his righteousness continues forever. (2 Corinthians 9:9)
- Now he that abundantly supplies seed to the sower and bread for eating will supply and multiply the seed for you to sow and will increase the products of your righteousness. (2 Corinthians 9:10)

- Let it be noted that these scriptures on **generosity** and liberality are not in conflict or out of balance with others that condemn ingrates, sluggards, and lazy persons.
- For example, the lazy one who will not plow in cold weather deserves nothing when begging in harvesttime, he that refuses to work is not entitled to the generosity of others.
- Because of winter the lazy one will not plow, he will be begging in reaping time, but there will be nothing. (Proverbs 20:4)
- In fact, also, when we were with you, we used to give you this order. If anyone does not want to work, neither let him eat. (2 Thessalonians 3:10)
- Widows were not to be put on the list for relief unless they qualified.
- Let a widow be put on the list who has become not less than sixty years old, a wife of one husband. (1 Timothy 5:9)
- Having a witness borne to her for fine works, if she reared children, if she entertained strangers, if she washed the feet of holy ones, if she relieved those in tribulation, if she diligently followed every good work. (1 Timothy 5:10)
- The contributions made by the congregations throughout Galatia, Macedonia, and Achaia were not for the needy ones among pagan worshipers in general but for the holy ones that were in need.
- Now concerning the collection that is for the holy ones, just as I gave orders to the congregations of Galatia, do that way also yourselves. (1 Corinthians 16:1)
- Now concerning the ministry that is for the holy ones, it is superfluous for me to write you. (2 Corinthians 9:1)
