It is the softest of the palatal letters except for *yohdh* and corresponds generally to the English g when it has within it the point, daghesh lene, but without this point it is pronounced softer, more down in the throat. In the Hebrew, this is the first letter in the opening word in each of the eight verses of
- Act appropriately toward your servant, that I may live and that I may keep your word. (Psalms 119:17)
- Uncover my eyes, that I may look at the wonderful things out of your law. (Psalms 119:18)
- I am but an alien resident in the land. Do not conceal from me your commandments. (Psalms 119:19)
- My soul is crushed with longing for your judicial decisions all the time. (Psalms 119:20)
- You have rebuked the cursed presumptuous ones, who are straying from your commandments. (Psalms 119:21)
