~HOMER (50)

- A dry measure corresponding to the cor and equaling ten baths or ten ephahs.
- As regards the ephah and the bath measure, there should come to be but one fixed amount, for the bath to carry a tenth of a homer and the tenth of the homer an ephah, with reference to the homer, its required amount should prove to be. (Ezekiel 45:11)
- And as for the allowance of the oil, there is the bath measure of the oil. The bath is a tenth of the cor. Ten baths are a homer, because ten baths are a homer. (Ezekiel 45:14)
- Based on the estimated volume of the bath measure, the ephah has been reckoned at 22 Liters ( 20 dry quarts). The homer would therefore equal $\mathbf{2 2 0}$ Liters ( $\mathbf{2 0 0}$ dry quarts).
- And I proceeded to purchase her for myself for fifteen silver pieces and a homer measure of barley and a half-homer of barley. (Hosea 3:2)
- In the wilderness, greedy Israelites gathered miraculously provided quail in such numbers that the one collecting least gathered ten homers, (2,200 Liters)(2,000 dry quarts)(62 bushels).
- Then the people got up all that day and all night and all the next day and kept gathering the quail. The one collecting least gathered ten homers, and they kept spreading them extensively all around the camp for themselves. (Numbers 11:32)
- The Scriptures also mention the homer as a measure for barley, seed, and wheat.

And if it is some of the field of his possession that a man would sanctify to Yehowah, the value must then be estimated in proportion to its seed, if a homer of barley seed, then at fifty shekels of silver. (Leviticus 27:16)

- For even ten acres of vineyard will produce but one bath measure, and even a homer measure of seed will produce but an
ephah measure. (Isaiah 5:10)
- This is the contribution that you should offer, the sixth part of the ephah from the homer of wheat, and the sixth part of the ephah from the homer of barley. (Ezekiel 45:13)
