[Hebrew, sa-khal', Greek, sy-ni'e-mi]

- Essentially, insight is the ability to see into a situation. To act with insight is to act with prudence, discretion. According to Wilsons Old Testament Word Studies, the Hebrew verb <u>sa-khal'</u> means to look at, to be prudent, circumspect, to act prudently, to be intelligent. [1978, p. 461] Thus, <u>sa-khal'</u> is rendered have insight.
- As for Yehowah, he has looked down from heaven itself upon the sons of men, to see whether there exists anyone having insight, anyone seeking Yehowah. (Psalms 14:2)
- Act with discretion.
- In the abundance of words there does not fail to be transgression, but the one keeping his lips in check is acting discreetly. (Proverbs 10:19)
- · Act prudently.
- And David began going out. Wherever Saul would send him he would act prudently, so that Saul placed him over the men of war, and it seemed good in the eyes of all the people and also in the eyes of the servants of Saul. (1 Samuel 18:5)
- Have success.
- The gift is a stone winning favor in the eyes of its grand owner. Everywhere that he turns he has success. (Proverbs 17:8)
- Cause to show insight.
- The heart of the wise one causes his mouth to show insight, and to his lips it adds persuasiveness. (Proverbs 16:23)
- The Hebrew noun *se'khel* is translated insight.
- The fear of Yehowah is the beginning of wisdom. All those doing them have a good insight. His praise is standing forever. (Psalms 111:10)

- Discretion
- And the man's name was Nabal, and his wife's name was Abigail. And the wife was good in discretion and beautiful in form, but the husband was harsh and bad in his practices, and he was a Calebite. (1 Samuel 25:3)
- Insight is closely related to understanding, but there is a fine distinction between the two terms. Says the Theological Wordbook of the Old Testament: While *bin*, understanding, indicates distinguishing between, *sa-khal'* relates to an intelligent knowledge of the reason.

- Perceive.
- On this account cease becoming unreasonable, but go on perceiving what the will of Yehowah is. (Ephesians 5:17)
- Yehowah God gives insight to his servants by providing them with counsel and advice that they can use to direct their steps and control their actions.
- I shall make you have insight and instruct you in the way you should go. I will give advice with my eye upon you. (Psalms 32:8)
- And he proceeded to impart understanding and speak with me and say; O Daniel, now I have come forth to make you have insight with understanding. (Daniel 9:22)
- He provides such wise guidance by means of his Word. To gain insight, though, a person must do more than read the Bible. He must appreciate it so as to be motivated to do all that God directs.
- Only be courageous and very strong to take care to do according to all the Law that Moses my servant commanded you. Do not turn aside from it to the right or to the left, in order, that you may act wisely everywhere you go. (Joshua 1:7)
- This book of the Law should not depart from your mouth, and you must in an undertone read in it day and night, in order, that

you may take care to do according to all that is written in it, for then you will make your way successful and then you will act wisely. (Joshua 1:8)

- Insight can be displayed in various ways, resulting in blessings both to the one who has it and to others. The psalmist pronounces happy the one, acting with consideration, with insight, toward the lowly one.
- Happy is anyone acting with consideration toward the lowly one, in the day of calamity Yehowah will provide escape for him. (Psalms 41:1)
- A wife who is discreet, showing insight, is described as a blessing from Yehowah.
- The inheritance from fathers is a house and wealth, but a discreet wife is from Yehowah. (Proverbs 19:14)
- Insight, looking beyond the obvious, enables one to guard his mouth.
- In the abundance of words there does not fail to be transgression, but the one keeping his lips in check is acting discreetly. (Proverbs 10:19)
- The heart of the wise one causes his mouth to show insight, and to his lips it adds persuasiveness. (Proverbs 16:23)
- To know when to keep silent.
- Therefore the very one having insight will in that time keep silent, for it will be a calamitous time. (Amos 5:13)
