## ~JUDAS 2 (39)

(Ju'das) [from Hebrew, a form of the name Judah]

- Judas the Galilean, referred to by Gamaliel in his address to the Sanhedrin.
- After him Judas the Galilean rose in the days of the registration, and he drew off people after him. And yet that man perished, and all those who were obeying him were scattered abroad. (Acts of Apostles 5:37)
- At the time of the registration identified with Quirinius governor of Syria in 6 C.E, Judas led a Jewish uprising. Josephus mentions him a number of times and states that he, incited his countrymen to revolt, upbraiding them as cowards for consenting to pay tribute to the Romans and tolerating mortal masters, after having God for their lord.
- This man was a sophist who founded a sect of his own, having nothing in common with the others. [The Jewish War, II, 118, viii, 1]
- In one place Josephus called Judas a Gaulanite, which some would relate to an area East of the Sea of Galilee. Yet in other places the same historian says Judas was a Galilean, as did Gamaliel. [Jewish Antiquities, XVIII, 3, i, 1, XVIII, 23, i, 6]
- These rebels stressed liberty, but they did not succeed in getting
