- For that would be loose conduct, and that would be an error for attention by the justices. (Job 31:11)
- That too would be an error for attention by the justices, for I should have denied the true God above. (Job 31:28)
- The phrase, for attention by the justices, is used in an adjective sense to describe errors calling for judgment. Thus in these verses An American Translation reads, a heinous sin.
- For that would be loose conduct, and that would be an error for attention by the justices. (Job 31:11)
- And a heinous crime.
- That too would be an error for attention by the justices, for I should have denied the true God above. (Job 31:28)
- Instead of an error for attention by the justices. The error under consideration in;
- For that would be loose conduct, and that would be an error for attention by the justices. (Job 31:11)
- Is adultery.
- If my heart has been enticed toward a woman, and I kept lying in wait at the very entranceway of my companion. (Job 31:9)
- Let my wife do the grinding for another man, and over her let other men kneel down. (Job 31:10)
- A crime that in Job's time may have been judged by the older men at the city gate.
- When I went forth to the gate by the town, in the public square I would prepare my seat! (Job 29:7)

- However, the error of;
- That too would be an error for attention by the justices, for I should have denied the true God above. (Job 31:28)
- Involves materialism and secret idolatry.
- If I have put gold as my confidence, or to gold I have said; You are my trust! (Job 31:24)
- If I used to rejoice because my property was much, and because my hand had found a lot of things. (Job 31:25)
- If I used to see the light when it would flash forth, or the precious moon walking along. (Job 31:26)
- And my heart began to be enticed in secrecy and my hand proceeded to kiss my mouth. (Job 31:27)
- Wrongs of mind and heart that cannot be established at the mouth of witnesses. Therefore, no human justices could determine guilt. Job, though, apparently recognized that God could judge such wrongs and that they were serious enough to warrant his judgment.
