- Any of a variety of grasshoppers with short antennae or feelers, especially those that migrate in great swarms. Of the several Hebrew words rendered, locust, 'ar-beh' appears most frequently and is understood to refer to the migratory locust, the insect in its fully developed, winged stage.
- These are the ones of them you may eat of: the migratory locust according to its kind, and the edible locust after its kind, and the cricket according to its kind, and the grasshopper according to its kind. (Leviticus 11:22) Footnote
- The Hebrew word *ye'leq* refers to the creeping, wingless locust, that is, one that is at an immature stage of development.
- He said that the **locusts** should come in, and a species of locust, even without number. (Psalms 105:34) Footnote
- What was left by the caterpillar, the locust has eaten, and what was left by the locust, the creeping, unwinged locust has eaten, and what the creeping, unwinged locust has left, the cockroach has eaten. (Joel 1:4)
- The Hebrew term *sol-`am'*, edible locust, possibly refers to a leaper and not a flier.

- A locust swarm is denoted by the Hebrew term *goh-vai'*.

- The Greek word a-kris' is rendered insect locust and locust.
- But this very John had his clothing of camels hair and a leather girdle around his loins, his food too was insect locusts and wild honey. (Matthew 3:4)
- And the likenesses of the locusts resembled horses prepared for battle, and upon their heads were what seemed to be crowns like gold, and their faces were as men's faces. (Revelation 9:7)
- The locust measures 5 centimeters (2 inches) or more in length. It is equipped with two pairs of wings, four walking legs, and two much longer leaper legs with broad thighs.
- The wide, transparent back wings, when not in use, lie folded under the thick membranous front wings. By means of its leaper legs, the insect is able to jump many times the length of its body.
- Can you cause it to leap like a locust? The dignity of its snorting is frightful. (Job 39:20)
- In Scripture the **locust** is at times used to represent innumerableness.
- For they and their livestock would come up with their tents. They would come as numerous as the locusts, and they and their camels were without number, and they would come into the land to ruin it. (Judges 6:5)
- Now Midian and Amalek and all the Easterners were plumped in the low plain as numerous as locusts, and their camels were without number, as numerous as the grains of sand that are on the seashore. (Judges 7:12)
- They will certainly cut down her forest, is the utterance of Yehowah, for it could not be penetrated. For they have become more numerous than the locust, and they are without number. (Jeremiah 46:23)
- Even there fire will devour you. A sword will cut you off. It will devour you like the locust species. Make yourself heavy in numbers like the locust species, make yourself heavy in numbers like the locust. (Nahum 3:15)

- The Law designated locusts as clean for food.
- Only this is what you may eat of all the winged swarming creatures that go upon all fours, those that have leaper legs above their feet with which to leap upon the earth. (Leviticus 11:21)
- These are the ones of them you may eat of, the migratory locust according to its kind, and the edible locust after its kind, and the cricket according to its kind, and the grasshopper according to its kind. (Leviticus 11:22)
- John the Baptizer, in fact, subsisted on insect locusts and honey.
- But this very John had his clothing of camels hair and a leather girdle around his loins, his food too was insect locusts and wild honey. (Matthew 3:4)
- These insects are said to taste something like shrimp or crab and are rich in protein, desert locusts, according to an analysis made at Jerusalem, consist of 75 percent protein. When used for food today, the head, legs, wings, and abdomen are removed. The remaining portion, the thorax, is cooked or eaten raw.

"Locust Plagues

- In Bible times a locust plague was a severe calamity and, on occasion, an expression of Yehowah's judgment, as was the eighth plague on ancient Egypt.
- For if you continue refusing to send my people away, here I am bringing locusts within your boundaries tomorrow. (Exodus 10:4)
- And they will actually cover the visible surface of the earth and it will not be possible to see the earth, and they will simply eat up

the rest of what has escaped, what has been left to you people by the hail, and they will certainly eat every sprouting tree of yours out of the field. (Exodus 10:5)

- And your houses and the houses of all your servants and the houses of all Egypt will be filled to an extent that your fathers and your father's fathers have not seen it from the day of their existing upon the ground until this day. With that he turned and went out from Pharaoh. (Exodus 10:6)
- Yehowah now said to Moses; Stretch your hand out over the land of Egypt for the locusts, that they may come up over the land of Egypt and eat up all the vegetation of the land, everything that the hail has let remain. (Exodus 10:12)
- Yehowah caused an east wind to blow upon the land all that day and all night. The morning came and the east wind carried the locusts. (Exodus 10:13)
- And the locusts began to come up over all the land of Egypt and to settle down upon all the territory of Egypt. They were very burdensome. Before them there had never turned up in this way locusts like them, and there will never turn up any in this way after them. (Exodus 10:14)
- And they went covering the visible surface of the entire land, and the land grew dark, and they went on eating up all the vegetation of the land and all the fruit of the trees that the hail had left, and there was left nothing green on the trees or on the vegetation of the field in all the land of Egypt. (Exodus 10:15)
- So Pharaoh hurriedly called Moses and Aaron and said; I have sinned against Yehowah your God and against you. (Exodus 10:16)
- Yehowah your God that he may turn away just this deadly plague from upon me. (Exodus 10:17)
- So he went out from Pharaoh and made entreaty to Yehowah. (Exodus 10:18)
- Then Yehowah made a shift to a very stiff west wind, and it

carried the locusts away and drove them into the Red Sea. Not a single locust was let remain in all the territory of Egypt. (Exodus 10:19)

- A lot of seed you will take out to the field, but little will you gather, because the locust will devour it. (Deuteronomy 28:38)
- In case a famine occurs in the land, in case a pestilence occurs, in case scorching, mildew, locusts, cockroaches occur, in case their enemy besieges them in the land of their gates, any sort of plague, any sort of malady. (1 Kings 8:37)
- In case a famine occurs in the land, in case a pestilence occurs, in case scorching and mildew, locusts and cockroaches occur, in case their enemies besiege them in the land of their gates, any sort of plague and any sort of malady. (2 Chronicles 6:28)
- And he began to give to the cockroaches their yield, and their toil to the locusts. (Psalms 78:46)
- He said that the **locusts** should come in, and a species of locust, even without number. (Psalms 105:34)
- Locusts, brought by the wind, arrive suddenly, but the sound of their coming, compared in Scripture to that of chariots and of a fire consuming stubble.
- What was left by the caterpillar, the locust has eaten, and what was left by the locust, the creeping, unwinged locust has eaten, and what the creeping, unwinged locust has left, the cockroach has eaten. (Joel 1:4)
- As with the sound of chariots on the tops of the mountains they keep skipping about, as with the sound of a flaming fire that is devouring stubble. It is like a mighty people, drawn up in battle order. (Joel 2:5)

- Can, it is said, be heard at a distance of about 10 kilometers (6 miles). Their flight is largely dependent on the wind, which, when favorable, enables them to cover many kilometers.
- Locust swarms have even been seen by persons at sea more than 1,600 kilometers (1,000 miles) from land. Unfavorable winds, though, can drive them into the water to their death.
- At once Moses stretched his rod out over the land of Egypt, and Yehowah caused an east wind to blow upon the land all that day and all night. The morning came and the east wind carried the locusts. (Exodus 10:13)
- Then Yehowah made a shift to a very stiff west wind, and it carried the locusts away and drove them into the Red Sea. Not a single locust was let remain in all the territory of Egypt. (Exodus 10:19)
- The effect of a large swarm in flight, reaching over 1,500 meters (5,000 feet in height) is comparable to a cloud that intercepts the light of the sun.
- Before it the land has become agitated, the heavens have rocked. Sun and moon themselves have become dark, and the very stars have withdrawn their brightness. (Joel 2:10)
- An invasion of **locusts** can transform a land from a paradise-like state into a wilderness, for their appetite is voracious.
- Ahead of it a fire has devoured, and behind it a flame consumes. Like the garden of Eden the land is ahead of it, but behind it is a desolate wilderness, and there has also proved to be nothing thereof escaping. (Joel 2:3)
- A single migratory locust consumes its own body weight in food in a day, that is proportionately 60 to 100 times as much as a human consumes.
- They eat not only greenery but also linen, wool, silk, and leather, not even sparing the varnish on the furniture as they penetrate the houses. The daily food consumption of a large swarm has been estimated as equaling that of a million and a half men.

- A swarm of locusts progresses like a well-organized, disciplined fighting force, but without king or leader, this testifying to their instinctive wisdom.
- There are four things that are the smallest of the earth, but they are instinctively wise. (Proverbs 30:24)
- The locusts have no king, and yet they go forth all of them divided into groups. (Proverbs 30:27)
- Even though many perish, the onslaught continues. Fires built to check their advance are extinguished by the bodies of the dead locusts. Water-filled ditches are of no avail in impeding their progress, for these likewise become filled with their dead bodies.
- Like powerful men they run. Like men of war they go up a wall. And they go each one in his own ways, and they do not alter their paths. (Joel 2:7)
- And one another they do not shove. As an able-bodied man in his course, they keep going, and should some fall even among the missiles, the others do not break off course. (Joel 2:8)
- Into the city they rush. On the wall they run. On the houses they go up. Through the windows they go in like the thief. (Joel 2:9)
- There is no known natural enemy that can keep their devastating migrations in check, wrote a zoology professor. [The New York Times Magazine, The Locust War, May 22,1960, p. 96]
- Describing locust plagues in more recent times, [Grzimek's Animal Life Encyclopedia [1975, Vol. 2, pp. 109,110] reports: Several species of spurthroated grasshoppers cause locust plagues even today in Africa and other parts of the world.
- Their occasional increase to tremendous numbers and widespread migrations caused great damage to food crops in recent times. In 1873-1875 C.E. in Europe and 1874-1877 C.E. in the U.S.A. the outbreaks were extremely severe.
- In 1955 C.E. a swarm of migratory locusts 250 kilometers long and 20 kilometers wide attacked southern Morocco. Again, in 1961/62 C.E, there was a plague there which could not be effectively combated

As a result, within five days the locusts had caused damage amounting to more than a billion francs in an area of over 5000 square kilometers.

In the five days, the migratory locusts consumed 7000 tons of oranges, the equivalent of 60,000 kilograms per hour. This is more than the yearly consumption of the entire country of France.

- The allusion here may be to the fact that cold weather makes the insects numb, causing them to hide in the crevices of walls until such time as they are warmed by the sun's rays, after which they fly away. It is reported that not until their bodies reach about 21° Centigrade (70° Fahrenheit) can locusts fly.
