[Hebrew, 'o-roth' or 'oh-roth']

- The dwarf mallow is a creeping plant having nearly round, somewhat lobed, saw-edged leaves with long leafstalks. Its flowers are over 1 centimeters (0.5 inches) across and vary in color from pale blue to white. The flat and circular mucilaginous fruits are commonly called cheeses.
- Mallows translates the Hebrew word 'o-roth'.
- Accordingly a certain one went out to the field to pick mallows, and he got to find a wild vine and went picking wild gourds from it, his garment full, and then came and sliced them into the stewpot, for they were not acquainted with them. (2 Kings 4:39)
- Your dead ones will live. A corpse of mine, they will rise up.

 Awake and cry out joyfully, you residents in the dust! For your dew is as the dew of mallows, and the earth itself will let even those impotent in death drop in birth. (Isaiah 26:19)
- Considered to be the plural of 'oh-rah', light.
- For the Jews there occurred light and rejoicing and exultation and honor. (Esther 8:16)
- Even the darkness itself would not prove too dark for you, but night itself would shine just as the day does, the darkness might just as well be the light. (Psalms 139:12)
- According to L. Koehler and W. Baumgartner's Lexicon in Veteris Testamenti Libros [Leiden, 1958, p. 90], 'o-roth' denotes the dwarf mallow, Malva rotundifolia.
- This identification is based on the fact that this plant is very sensitive to light, hence perhaps the Hebrew designation meaning, light-herbs. Also, its fruit is edible, thus harmonizing with.
