## ~NEBO 3 (63) (Ne'bo)

- Evidently one of the mountains of Abarim. It was from Mount Nebo or from the top of Pisgah, which may have been a part of Nebo or Nebo may have been a part of Pisgah, that Moses viewed the Promised Land, and then he died there.
- And Yehowah proceeded to speak to Moses on this same day, saying; (Deuteronomy 32:48)
- Go up into this mountain of Abarim, Mount Nebo, which is in the land of Moab, which fronts toward Jericho, and see the land of Canaan, which I am giving to the sons of Israel as a possession. (Deuteronomy 32:49)
- Then die on the mountain into which you are going up, and be gathered to your people, just as Aaron your brother died on Mount Hor and got to be gathered to his people. (Deuteronomy 32:50)
- For the reason that you men acted undutifully toward me in the middle of the sons of Israel at the waters of Meribah of Kadesh in the wilderness of Zin, for the reason that you men did not sanctify me in the middle of the sons of Israel. (Deuteronomy 32:51)
- For from a distance you will see the land, but you will not go there into the land that I am giving to the sons of Israel. (Deuteronomy 32:52)
- Then Moses proceeded to go up from the desert plains of Moab into Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which fronts toward Jericho. And Yehowah went showing him all the land, Gilead as far as Dan. (Deuteronomy 34:1)
- And all Naphtali and the land of Ephraim and Manasseh and all the land of Judah as far as the western sea. (Deuteronomy 34:2)
- And the Negeb and the District, the valley plain of Jericho, the city of the palm trees, as far as Zoar. (Deuteronomy 34:3)

- And Yehowah went on to say to him; This is the land about which I have sworn to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, saying; To your seed I shall give it. I have caused you to see it with your own eyes, as you will not cross over there. (Deuteronomy 34:4)
- Mount Nebo is generally identified with Jebel en-Neba, Har Nevo. This mountain has an elevation of more than 820 meters (2,700 feet) above sea level and is located about 17 kilometers (11 miles) East of where the Jordan enters the Dead Sea.
- It is believed that Pisgah may be Ras es-Siyaghah, an eminence just Northwest of and slightly lower than the peak of Jebel en-Neba. On a clear day the top of Ras es-Siyaghah provides a splendid view of Mounts Hermon, Tabor, Ebal, and Gerizim, the central mountain ridge on which Bethlehem and Hebron are situated, as well as the Jordan Valley and the Dead Sea.
