- A slender tool with a sharp point at one end and a hole, or eye, at the other, used for sewing with thread, or sometimes with leather strips, and for embroidering.
- And they must make the ephod of gold, blue thread and wool dyed reddish purple, coccus scarlet material and fine twisted linen, the work of an embroiderer. (Exodus 28:6)
- And he has put it into his heart that he should teach, he and Oholiab the son of Ahisamach of the tribe of Dan. (Exodus 35:34)
- He has filled them with wisdom of heart to do all the work of a craftsman and an embroiderer and of a weaver in blue thread and wool dyed reddish purple, in coccus scarlet material and fine linen, and of a loom worker, men doing every sort of work and designing devices. (Exodus 35:35)
- A time to rip apart and a time to sew together. A time to keep quiet and a time to speak. (Ecclesiastes 3:7)
- Further, he went on to give an illustration to them; No one cuts a patch from a new outer garment and sews it onto an old outer garment, but if he does, then both the new patch tears away and the patch from the new garment does not match the old. (Luke 5:36)
- While bone needles and some made of ivory have been discovered at ancient sites, bronze needles were generally used. They are very similar to present-day needles.
- Bronze needles varying in length from approximately 4 to 14 centimeters (1.5 to 5.5 inches) have been found in Palestine. Some Egyptian bronze needles were from 8 to 9 centimeters (3 to 3.5 inches) long.
