~PERGA (44) (Per'ga)

- A prominent city in the Roman province of Pamphylia. The ruins of ancient Perga are believed to be near the modern village of Murtana, about 13 kilometers (8 miles) inland from the South coast of Asia Minor and some 8 kilometers (5 miles) West of the Cestrus (Aksu) River.
- It appears that anciently, according to the Greek geographer
 Strabo, this river was navigable as far North as Perga. [Geography, 14, IV,
 2]
- However, nearby Attalia on the coast of Pamphylia seems to have served as Pergas harbor and, in time, even displaced Perga in importance.
- And they went through Pisidia and came into Pamphylia. (Acts of Apostles 14:24)
- And, after speaking the word in Perga, they went down to Attalia. (Acts of Apostles 14:25)
- And from there they sailed off for Antioch, where they had been entrusted to the undeserved kindness of God for the work they had fully performed. (Acts of Apostles 14:26)
- It was to this city that the apostle Paul and his associates came early in the course of his first missionary journey.
- The men, together with Paul, now put out to sea from Paphos and arrived at Perga in Pamphylia. But John withdrew from them and returned to Jerusalem. (Acts of Apostles 13:13)
- Toward its close they spoke the word in Perga, but whether any of the populace accepted Christianity is not known.
- And they went through Pisidia and came into Pamphylia. (Acts of Apostles 14:24)
- And, after speaking the word in Perga, they went down to Attalia. (Acts of Apostles 14:25)
