~PHILEMON (115) (Phi-le'mon) [Loving]

- A Christian slave owner associated with the congregation at Colossae. His house in this city of southwestern Asia Minor served as a meeting place for the congregation there.
- Philemon proved himself to be a source of refreshment to fellow Christians and an example in faith and love. The apostle Paul regarded him as a beloved fellow worker.
- Paul, a prisoner for the sake of Christ Jesus, and Timothy, our brother, to Philemon, our beloved one and fellow worker. (Philemon 1:1)
- And to Apphia, our sister, and to Archippus, our fellow soldier, and to the congregation that is in your house. (Philemon 1:2)
- As I keep hearing of your love and faith which you have toward the Lord Jesus and toward all the holy ones. (Philemon 1:5)
- In order, that the sharing of your faith may go into action by your acknowledging of every good thing among us as related to Christ. (Philemon 1:6)
- For I got much joy and comfort over your love, because the tender affections of the holy ones have been refreshed through you, brother. (Philemon 1:7)
- Along with Onesimus, my faithful and beloved brother, who is from among you. All the things here they will make known to you. (Colossians 4:9)
- I am exhorting you concerning my child, to whom I became a father while in my prison bonds, Onesimus. (Philemon 1:10)
- Formerly useless to you but now useful to you and to me. (Philemon 1:11)
- This very one I am sending back to you, yes, him, that is, my own tender affections. (Philemon 1:12)

- Paul's desire to lodge with **Philemon** reflects favorably on this man's hospitality.
- But along with that, also get lodging ready for me, for I am hoping that through the prayers of you people I shall be set at liberty for you. (Philemon 1:22)
- And a certain woman named Lydia, a seller of purple, of the city of Thyatira and a worshiper of God, was listening, and Yehowah opened her heart wide to pay attention to the things being spoken by Paul. (Acts of Apostles 16:14)
- Now when she and her household got baptized, she said with entreaty; If you men have judged me to be faithful to Yehowah, enter into my house and stay. And she just made us come. (Acts of Apostles 16:15)
- Apphia and Archippus seem to have been members of Philemons household, as they are also addressed in Paul's personal letter to Philemon. Apphia was perhaps Philemons wife, and Archippus may have been his son.
- And to Apphia, our sister, and to Archippus, our fellow soldier, and to the congregation that is in your house. (Philemon 1:2)
- It appears that **Philemon** became a Christian through Paul's efforts.
- I Paul am writing with my own hand. I will pay it back, not to be telling you that, besides, you owe me even yourself. (Philemon 1:19)
- However, since Paul had done no preaching in Colossae itself.
- For I want you to realize how great a struggle I am having in behalf of you and of those at Laodicea and of all those who have not seen my face in the flesh. (Colossians 2:1)
- Philemon may have become acquainted with Christianity as a result of the apostles two-year activity in Ephesus, when all those inhabiting the district of Asia, which embraced Colossae, heard the word of the Lord.
- This took place for two years, so that all those inhabiting the

district of Asia heard the word of the Lord, both Jews and Greeks. (Acts of Apostles 19:10)

- Sometime before receiving Paul's letter, Philemon had been deserted by his slave Onesimus. This runaway slave possibly even stole funds from his master to finance the voyage to Rome, where he later met Paul and became a Christian.
- I am exhorting you concerning my child, to whom I became a father while in my prison bonds, Onesimus. (Philemon 1:10)
- Formerly useless to you but now useful to you and to me. (Philemon 1:11)
- Moreover, if he did you any wrong or owes you anything, keep this charged to my account. (Philemon 1:18)
- I Paul am writing with my own hand. I will pay it back, not to be telling you that, besides, you owe me even yourself. (Philemon 1:19)
