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- A book consisting of a compilation of proverbs or wise sayings from a number of other collections. The book itself sets forth its objective;
- For one to know wisdom and discipline, to discern the sayings of understanding. (Proverbs 1:2)
- To receive the discipline that gives insight, righteousness and judgment and uprightness. (Proverbs 1:3)
- To give to the inexperienced ones shrewdness, to a young man knowledge and thinking ability. (Proverbs 1:4)
- The purpose is that you may walk in the way of good people and that the paths of the righteous ones you may keep.
- The purpose is that you may walk in the way of good people and

that the paths of the righteous ones you may keep. (Proverbs 2:20)

- The introductions to three of the books sections attribute the proverbs contained in them to Solomon.
- The proverbs of Solomon the son of David, the king of Israel. (Proverbs 1:1)
- A wise son is the one that makes a father rejoice, and a stupid son is the grief of his mother. (Proverbs 10:1)
- These also are the proverbs of Solomon that the men of Hezekiah the king of Judah transcribed. (Proverbs 25:1)
- This agrees with the fact that Solomon could speak three thousand proverbs.
- And he could speak three thousand proverbs, and his songs came to be a thousand and five. (1 Kings 4:32)
- There can be little question that many, if not all, of the proverbs in these sections were recorded during Solomon's reign. With reference to himself, Solomon stated:
- And besides the fact that the congregator had become wise, he also taught the people knowledge continually, and he pondered and made a thorough search, that he might arrange many proverbs in order. (Ecclesiastes 12:9)
- The congregator sought to find the delightful words and the writing of correct words of truth. (Ecclesiastes 12:10)
- However, various arguments have been advanced against crediting most of the proverbs to Solomon. Certain proverbs;
- The rage of a king means messengers of death, but the wise man is one that averts it. (Proverbs 16:14)
- The raging of a king is a growling like that of a maned young lion, but his goodwill is like the dew upon the vegetation. (Proverbs 19:12)
- The frightfulness of a king is a growling like that of a maned

- young lion. Anyone drawing his fury against himself is sinning against his own soul. (Proverbs 20:2)
- The heavens for height and the earth for depth, and the heart of kings, that is unsearchable. (Proverbs 25:3)
- Have been cited as being derogatory to monarchs and therefore not from the time of Solomon. Upon closer examination, though, it is found that, instead of being derogatory, these proverbs exalt kings, showing that they should be accorded due fear because of their power.
- My son, fear Yehowah and the king. With those who are for a change, do not intermeddle. (Proverbs 24:21)
- Those who claim that a polygamist like Solomon would not have spoken of husband-wife relationships in such a way as to imply monogamy
- Drink water out of your own cistern, and tricklings out of the midst of your own well. (Proverbs 5:15)
- Should your springs be scattered out of doors, your streams of water in the public squares themselves? (Proverbs 5:16)
- Let them prove to be for you alone, and not for strangers with you. (Proverbs 5:17)
- Let your water source prove to be blessed, and rejoice with the wife of your youth. (Proverbs 5:18)
- A lovable hind and a charming mountain goat. Let her own breasts intoxicate you at all times. With her love may you be in an ecstasy constantly. (Proverbs 5:19)
- Such a way as to imply monogamy,
- Has one found a good wife? One has found a good thing, and one gets goodwill from Yehowah. (Proverbs 18:22)
- A stupid son means adversities to his father, and the contentions of a wife are as a leaking roof that drives one away. (Proverbs 19:13)
- The inheritance from father's is a house and wealth, but a

discreet wife is from Yehowah. (Proverbs 19:14)

- Lose sight of the fact that polygamy was not advocated, but simply tolerated, and regulated by the Law.
- And it may well be that the Jews generally practiced monogamy. Likewise such critics forget that Proverbs is inspired of God and is not simply the opinions of Solomon.
- Nevertheless, from his observations and his own experiences Solomon may very well have come to appreciate the wisdom of God's original standard for marriage, monogamy.
- I accumulated also silver and gold for myself, and property peculiar to kings and the jurisdictional districts. I made male singers and female singers for myself and the exquisite delights of the sons of mankind, a lady, even ladies. (Ecclesiastes 2:8)
- See! This I have found, said the congregator, one thing taken after another, to find out the sum-up. (Ecclesiastes 7:27)
- Which my soul has continuously sought, but I have not found.
 One man out of a thousand I have found, but a woman among all these I have not found. (Ecclesiastes 7:28)
- See! This only I have found, that the true God made mankind upright, but they themselves have sought out many plans. (Ecclesiastes 7:29)
- The proverbs not attributed to Solomon had their origin in the sayings of other wise men and one woman.
- Incline your ear and hear the words of the wise ones, that you may apply your very heart to my knowledge. (Proverbs 22:17)
- The words of Agur the son of Jakeh, the weighty message. The utterance of the able-bodied man to Ithiel, to Ithiel and Ucal. (Proverbs 30:1)
- The words of Lemuel the king, the weighty message that his mother gave to him in correction. (Proverbs 31:1)

- Just when all these proverbs were put into final form is not precisely known. The last time indicator appearing in the book itself is a reference to Hezekiah's reign.
- These also are the proverbs of Solomon that the men of Hezekiah the king of Judah transcribed. (Proverbs 25:1)
- So there is a basis for believing that the proverbs were compiled in book form by the time of that rulers death, circa 717 B.C.E. The repetition of certain proverbs suggests that the book was compiled from various separate collections.

- The book of Proverbs is written in Hebrew poetic style, which consists of thought rhythm, employing parallelisms, the ideas of which are either similar.

- Pride is before a crash, and a haughty spirit before stumbling. (Proverbs 16:18)

- Look! The righteous one, in the earth he will be rewarded. How much more should the wicked one and the sinner be! (Proverbs 11:31)
- Just like a dog returning to its vomit, the stupid one is repeating his foolishness. (Proverbs 26:11)

And the disciple James

- However, the undeserved kindness which he gives is greater. Hence it says; God opposes the haughty ones, but he gives undeserved kindness to the humble ones. (James 4:6)

- The book of Proverbs speaks much about knowledge in conjunction with discernment, wisdom, understanding, and thinking ability.
- The knowledge that it strives to impart and encourage is, therefore, more than mere head knowledge, an array of facts or learning. Proverbs points out that any true knowledge has as its starting point an appreciation of ones relationship to Yehowah. In fact, at. (Proverbs Chapter 1, verse 7), the theme of the book is set forth.
- Of course, the most important knowledge that one can acquire is about God himself. The knowledge of the Most Holy One is what understanding is, says
- The fear of Yehowah is the start of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Most Holy One is what understanding is. (Proverbs 9:10)

- This knowledge goes beyond the mere fact of God's existence and his creatorship, even beyond the knowledge of many facts about his dealings. To know him denotes a deep appreciation of his fine qualities and his great name, and a close relationship with him.
- Jesus Christ said to Jews who had knowledge about God:
- All things have been delivered to me by my Father, and no one fully knows the Son but the Father, neither does anyone fully know the Father but the Son and anyone to whom the Son is willing to reveal him. (Matthew 11:27)
- A knowledge of Yehowah's qualities will deepen ones proper fear of God, and it will bring the realization that Yehowah is deserving of all worship and service and that to know and obey him is the way of life.
- The fear of Yehowah is a well of life, to turn away from the snares of death. (Proverbs 14:27)
- The fear of Yehowah tends toward life, and one will spend the night satisfied, one will not be visited with what is bad. (Proverbs 19:23)

· Yehowah The Creator

- Yehowah, in matchless wisdom, is the Creator of all things and the Decreer of the laws governing these things, so he deserves the worship of all creatures.
- Yehowah himself in wisdom founded the earth. He solidly fixed the heavens in discernment. (Proverbs 3:19)
- By his knowledge the watery deeps themselves were split apart, and the cloudy skies keep dripping down light rain. (Proverbs 3:20)
- He made the hearing ear and the seeing eye, both literally and in a moral sense. Accordingly, one must look to Him in order to see and hear with true understanding. And a person must realize his accountability to the One who sees and hears all.
- The hearing ear and the seeing eye, Yehowah himself has made even both of them. (Proverbs 20:12)

- The book exalts Yehowah as the center of all things and the One in whom all righteous principles find their origin. For example:

- Two sorts of weights and two sorts of ephah measures, they are both of them together something detestable to Yehowah. (Proverbs 20:10)
- By fearing him, one learns to love what He loves and to hate what He hates and thereby make ones way of life straight, for the fear of Yehowah means the hating of bad.
- The fear of Yehowah means the hating of bad. Self-exaltation and pride and the bad way and the perverse mouth I have hated. (Proverbs 8:13)
- Proverbs reveals that Yehowah especially hates lofty eyes, a false tongue, hands shedding innocent blood, a heart fabricating hurtful schemes, feet in a hurry to run to badness, a false and lying witness, and one causing contentions among brothers.
- There are six things that Yehowah does hate, yes, seven are things detestable to his soul. (Proverbs 6:16)
- Lofty eyes, a false tongue, and hands that are shedding innocent blood. (Proverbs 6:17)
- A heart fabricating hurtful schemes, feet that are in a hurry to run to badness. (Proverbs 6:18)
- A false witness that launches forth lies, and anyone sending forth contentions among brothers. (Proverbs 6:19)

- False lips are something detestable to Yehowah, but those acting in faithfulness are a pleasure to him. (Proverbs 12:22)
- Yehowah. Hand may join to hand, yet one will not be free from punishment. (Proverbs 16:5)
- One who truly hates these things is well on the way to life.
- Additionally, the book of **Proverbs** illuminates the way of the righteous by showing what Yehowah approves.
- Those crooked at heart are something detestable to Yehowah, but the ones blameless in their way are a pleasure to him. (Proverbs 11:20)
- The sacrifice of the wicked ones is something detestable to Yehowah, but the prayer of the upright ones is a pleasure to him. (Proverbs 15:8)
- Yehowah is far away from the wicked ones, but the prayer of the righteous ones he hears. (Proverbs 15:29)
- One that is good gets approval from Yehowah.

- One knowing Yehowah realizes through knowledge and experience that, as;
- There is no wisdom, nor any discernment, nor any counsel in opposition to Yehowah. (Proverbs 21:30)
- Says, there is no wisdom, nor any discernment, nor any counsel in opposition to Yehowah. Therefore, though he may hear other plans or have them in his own heart, the sensible person will direct his way

of life in harmony with the counsel of Yehowah, knowing that contrary counsel, no matter how seemingly wise or plausible, cannot stand against the word of Yehowah.

- Many are the plans in the heart of a man, but the counsel of Yehowah is what will stand. (Proverbs 19:21)
- Now, look! I am going today in the way of all the earth, and you well know with all your hearts and with all your souls that not one word out of all the good words that Yehowah your God has spoken to you has failed. They have all come true for you. Not one word of them has failed. (Joshua 23:14)
- For truly I say to you that sooner would heaven and earth pass away than for one smallest letter or one particle of a letter to pass away from the Law by any means and not all things take place. (Matthew 5:18)
- Inspired King Solomon said,
- Trust in Yehowah with all your heart and do not lean upon your own understanding. (Proverbs 3:5)
- In all your ways take notice of him, and he himself will make your paths straight. (Proverbs 3:6)
- A man's heart chooses the way he desires to go, but even when he chooses the correct way, to succeed he must look to Yehowah to direct his steps.
- Roll your works upon Yehowah himself and your plans will be firmly established. (Proverbs 16:3)
- The heart of earthling man may think out his way, but Yehowah himself does the directing of his steps. (Proverbs 16:9)
- From Yehowah are the steppings of an able-bodied man. As regards earthling man, how can he discern his way? (Proverbs 20:24)
- I well know, O Yehowah, that to earthling man his way does not belong. It does not belong to man who is walking even to direct his step. (Jeremiah 10:23)

- Having chosen the path of life, the individual should recognize Yehowah's keen interest in him. Proverbs reminds us that Yehowah's eyes are in every place, keeping watch upon the bad ones and the good ones.
- The eyes of Yehowah are in every place, keeping watch upon the bad ones and the good ones. (Proverbs 15:3)
- For the ways of man are in front of the eyes of Yehowah, and he is contemplating all his tracks.
- For the ways of man are in front of the eyes of Yehowah, and he is contemplating all his tracks. (Proverbs 5:21)
- Not only what he appears to be outwardly but also his heart is examined by Yehowah.
- The refining pot is for silver and the furnace for gold, but Yehowah is the examiner of hearts. (Proverbs 17:3)

- Every way of a man is upright in his own eyes, but Yehowah is making an estimate of hearts. (Proverbs 21:2)
- And He weighs the true value of the thinking, motivation, and inmost desires of the person.

- The wicked is a ransom for the righteous one, and the one dealing treacherously takes the place of the upright ones. (Proverbs 21:18)
- Among such wicked ones are the proud, who are detestable to Yehowah. They will not be free from punishment.
- Yehowah. Hand may join to hand, yet one will not be free from punishment. (Proverbs 16:5)

- The house of the self-exalted ones Yehowah will tear down.
- The house of the self-exalted ones Yehowah will tear down, but he will fix the boundary of the widow. (Proverbs 15:25)
- He will rob of soul those robbing the lowly.
- Do not rob the lowly one because he is lowly, and do not crush the afflicted one in the gate. (Proverbs 22:22)
- For Yehowah himself will plead their cause, and he will certainly rob of soul those robbing them. (Proverbs 22:23)
- By observing these dealings of Yehowah the right-minded man makes his paths straight.
- Smooth out the course of your foot, and may all your own ways be firmly established. (Proverbs 4:26)
- He sees that allowing partiality through bribery,
- One who is wicked will take even a bribe from the bosom to bend the paths of judgment. (Proverbs 17:23)
- Or influence of personality,
- The showing of partiality to the wicked one is not good, nor the turning aside of the righteous one in judgment. (Proverbs 18:5)
- Causes one to pervert judgment. Pronouncing the wicked righteous and the righteous wicked would make him detestable in Yehowah's eyes.
- Anyone pronouncing the wicked one righteous and anyone pronouncing the righteous one wicked, even both of them are something detestable to Yehowah. (Proverbs 17:15)
- He also learns not to be prejudiced but to hear fully both sides of a matter before judging it.
- When anyone is replying to a matter before he hears it, that is foolishness on his part and a humiliation. (Proverbs 18:13)

" Security With Happiness

- To the one who guards practical wisdom and thinking ability that he receives from Yehowah, the book of Proverbs says; Yehowah himself will prove to be, in effect, your confidence, and he will certainly keep your foot against capture.
- My son, may they not get away from your eyes. Safeguard practical wisdom and thinking ability. (Proverbs 3:21)
- For Yehowah himself will prove to be, in effect, your confidence, and he will certainly keep your foot against capture. (Proverbs 3:26)
- The way of Yehowah is a stronghold for the blameless one, but ruin is for the practicers of what is hurtful. (Proverbs 10:29)
- In the fear of Yehowah there is strong confidence, and for his sons there will come to be a refuge. (Proverbs 14:26)
- If one fears Yehowah, in that case there will exist a future.
- Let your heart not be envious of sinners, but be in the fear of Yehowah all day long. (Proverbs 23:17)
- For in that case there will exist a future, and your own hope will not be cut off. (Proverbs 23:18)
- Moreover, not only is there a future hope but there is also happiness and security for the present time.
- You will not need to be afraid of any sudden dreadful thing, nor of the storm upon the wicked ones, because it is coming. (Proverbs 3:25)
- For Yehowah himself will prove to be, in effect, your confidence, and he will certainly keep your foot against capture. (Proverbs 3:26)
- When Yehowah takes pleasure in the ways of a man he causes even his enemies themselves to be at peace with him. (16:7) God will not let the righteous one go hungry.
- Yehowah will not cause the soul of the righteous one to go

hungry, but the craving of the wicked ones he will push away. (Proverbs 10:3)

- If a person honors God with the valuable things he possesses, his stores of supply will be filled with plenty.
- Honor Yehowah with your valuable things and with the firstfruits of all your produce. (Proverbs 3:9)
- Then your stores of supply will be filled with plenty, and with new wine your own press vats will overflow. (Proverbs 3:10)
- He adds days to such a man's life.
- The very fear of Yehowah will add days, but the years themselves of the wicked ones will be cut short. (Proverbs 10:27)
- One taking refuge in Yehowah's name, understanding and acknowledging that name for all that it represents, will find it to be like a strong tower, a place to which, in ancient times, people fled for safety from the enemy.
- The name of Yehowah is a strong tower. Into it the righteous runs and is given protection. (Proverbs 18:10)
- Trembling at men is what lays a snare, but he that is trusting in Yehowah will be protected. (Proverbs 29:25)
- Humility before Yehowah brings riches and glory and life.
- The result of humility and the fear of Yehowah is riches and glory and life. (Proverbs 22:4)
- Mercy and truth are what he desires, these are more valuable than sacrifice. Those who turn from bad, who fear Yehowah, and who serve him in this manner will not receive his adverse judgment.
- By loving-kindness and trueness error is atoned for, and in the fear of Yehowah one turns away from bad. (Proverbs 16:6)

- These are to be written upon the tablet of the heart.
- May loving-kindness and trueness themselves not leave you. Tie them about your throat. Write them upon the tablet of your heart. (Proverbs 3:3)
- More than all else the heart is to be safeguarded.
- More than all else that is to be guarded, safeguard your heart, for out of it are the sources of life. (Proverbs 4:23)
- It is with all the heart that one is to trust in Yehowah.

- As a silver glazing overlaid upon a fragment of earthenware are fervent lips along with a bad heart. (Proverbs 26:23)
- With his lips the hater makes himself unrecognizable, but inside of him he puts deception. (Proverbs 26:24)
- Although he makes his voice gracious, do not believe in him, for there are seven detestable things in his heart. (Proverbs 26:25)
- Hatred is covered over by deceit. His badness will be uncovered in the congregation. (Proverbs 26:26)
- He that is excavating a pit will fall into the same, and he that is rolling away a stone, back to him it will return. (Proverbs 26:27)
- A tongue that is false hates the one crushed by it, and a flattering mouth causes an overthrow. (Proverbs 26:28)
