~PUBLIUS (23)

(Pub'li-us) [from Latin meaning, Popular]

- A wealthy land-owning resident of Malta who kindly entertained Paul and those with him for three days after their shipwreck on the island. Paul, in turn, healed Publius father of fever and dysentery.
- Now in the neighborhood of that place the principal man of the island, named Publius, had lands, and he received us hospitably and entertained us benevolently three days. (Acts of Apostles 28:7)
- But it happened that the father of Publius was lying down distressed with fever and dysentery, and Paul went in to him and prayed, laid his hands upon him and healed him. (Acts of Apostles 28:8)
- Publius was the principal man of the island. In this instance such a designation appears to denote an official title comparable to governor, probably denoting the leading Roman officer on the island.
