(Se'lah)[Greek, di-a'psal-ma, a musical interlude]

- A transliterated Hebrew expression found frequently in the Psalms and also appearing in (Habakkuk Chapter 3). Although it is generally thought to be a technical term for music or recitation, its exact significance is unknown.
- It is held by some to mean a pause, suspension, or holding back, either of the singing of the Psalms for a musical interlude or of both singing and instrumental music for silent meditation.
- In either event, the pause was doubtless used to make the fact or sentiment just expressed more impressive, to allow the full import of the last utterance to sink in.
- The Greek Septuagint rendering of Selah is di-a'psal-ma, defined as a musical interlude. Selah always appears at the end of a clause and generally at the end of a strophe, every occurrence being in a song containing some kind of musical direction or expression. In
- Yehowah is known by the judgment that he has executed. By the activity of his own hands the wicked one has been ensnared. (Psalms 9:16)
- It is accompanied by Higgaion, there understood by some to be associated with the music of the harp.
