## ~TIRSHATHA (38) (Tir-sha'tha)

- The Persian title for the governor of a jurisdictional district. In the five times it is used, it is preceded by the Hebrew definite article *ha*, making it in English the Tirshatha.
- The officials mentioned in the Bible by the title Tirshatha ruled over Judah, one of the Persian provinces. Zerubbabel was evidently the Tirshatha mentioned in;
- Consequently the Tirshatha said to them that they could not eat from the most holy things until a priest stood up with Urim and Thummim. (Ezra 2:63)
- Consequently the Tirshatha said to them that they should not eat from the most holy things until the priest with Urim and Thummim stood up. (Nehemiah 7:65)
- And there was a part of the heads of the paternal houses that gave to the work. The Tirshatha himself gave to the treasure a thousand gold drachmas, fifty bowls, five hundred and thirty priests robes. (Nehemiah 7:70)
- Later when Nehemiah became governor he was the Tirshatha and is referred to as such at;
- And Nehemiah, that is, the Tirshatha, and Ezra the priest, the copyist, and the Levites who were instructing the people proceeded to say to all the people; This very day is holy to Yehowah your God. Do not mourn or weep. For all the people were weeping as they were hearing the words of the law. (Nehemiah 8:9)
- Now attesting it by seal there were, Nehemiah the Tirshatha, the son of Hacaliah, and Zedekiah. (Nehemiah 10:1)
