~WEEDS (232)
[Hebrew, bo '-shah', stink , choh'ach -thorny weeds, Greek, zi-za'ni-a]

- Generally, troublesome plants that serve no apparent useful purpose where they grow. While some scholars have endeavored to link with specific plants the various original-language words rendered weeds in the Bible, no certain identification is possible.
- The Hebrew word bo '-shah' is considered to be derived from a root meaning, stink and therefore probably embraces a variety of foulsmelling plants, stinking weeds. Faithful Job, in effect, stated that if his life course had not been one of integrity, then, instead of barley, let stinking weeds grow.
- Instead of wheat let the thorny weed go forth, and instead of barley stinking weeds. The words of Job have come to an end. (Job 31:40)
- Another Hebrew term, choh'ach, is understood to designate thorny plants generally, thorny weeds that grow on cultivated ground and quickly take possession of desolated land.

- On her dwelling towers thorns must come up, nettles and thorny weeds in her fortified places, and she must become an abiding place of jackals, the courtyard for the ostriches. (Isaiah 34:13)

For, look! They will have to go because of despoiling. Egypt itself will collect them together. Memphis, for its part, will bury them. As for their desirable things of silver, nettles themselves will take possession of them. Thorny bushes will be in their tents. (Hosea 9:6)

Can you put a rush in its nostrils, or with a thorn can you bore its jaws? (Job 41:2)

- Where the allusion seems to be to a thorn put into the gills of a fish for carrying purposes. Choh'ach is also employed in an illustrative sense.
- Can you put a rush in its nostrils, or with a thorn can you bore its jaws? (Job 41:2)
- A thorny weed in the hand of a drunkard can bring injury to him and to others, so it is with stupid people who use a proverb wrongly because of not understanding it.
- As a thorny weed has come up into the hand of a drunkard, so a proverb into the mouth of stupid people. (Proverbs 26:9)
- King Jehoash of Israel compared the action of proud King Amaziah of Judah in wanting to fight him to a thorny weeds asking for a marriage alliance with a cedar of Lebanon.
- Then it was that Amaziah sent messengers to Jehoash the son of Jehoahaz the son of Jehu the king of Israel, saying; Do come. Let us look each other in the face. (2 Kings 14:8)

At that Jehoash the king of Israel sent to Amaziah the king of Judah, saying; The thorny weed itself that was in Lebanon sent to the cedar that was in Lebanon, saying; Do give your daughter to my son as a wife. However, a wild beast of the field that was in Lebanon passed by and trampled the thorny weed down. (2 Kings 14:9)

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- The Hebrew designation sha'yith appears to denote a variety of weeds that grow on neglected or desolated land.

And I shall set it as a thing destroyed. It will not be pruned, nor will it be hoed. And it must come up with the thornbush and weeds, and upon the clouds I shall lay a command to keep from precipitating any rain upon it. (Isaiah 5:6)

And it must occur in that day that every place where there used to be a thousand vines, worth a thousand pieces of silver, will come to be, for the thornbushes and for the weeds it will come to be. (Isaiah 7:23)

With arrows and the bow he will come there, because all the land will become mere thornbushes and weeds. (Isaiah 7:24)

- And all the mountains that used to be cleared of troublesome plants with a hoe, you will not come there for fear of thornbushes and weeds, and it will certainly become a place for letting bulls loose and a trampling ground of sheep. (Isaiah 7:25)
- There is no rage that I have. Who will give me thornbushes and weeds in the battle? I will step on such. I will set such on fire at the same time. (Isaiah 27:4)
- This term, rendered, weeds, is used figuratively to represent people who by their unfaithfulness have become worthless and fit only for destruction.

For wickedness has become aflame just like a fire, thornbushes and weeds it will eat up. And it will catch fire in the thickets of the forest, and they will be borne aloft as the billowing of smoke. (Isaiah 9:18)

- In the fury of Yehowah of armies the land has been set afire, and the people will become as food for the fire. No one will show compassion even on his brother. (Isaiah 9:19)

And Israel's Light must become a fire, and his Holy One a flame, and it must blaze up and eat up his weeds and his thornbushes in one day. (Isaiah 10:17)

And the glory of his forest and of his orchard He will bring to an end, even from the soul clear to the flesh, and it must become like the melting away of one that is ailing. (Isaiah 10:18)

And the rest of the trees of his forest, they will become such a number that a mere boy will be able to write them down. (Isaiah 10:19)

- The tree that you beheld, that grew great and became strong and the height of which finally reached the heavens and which was
visible to all the earth. (Daniel 4:20)
And the foliage of which was fair, and the fruit of which was abundant, and on which there was food for all, under which the beasts of the field would dwell, and on the boughs of which the birds of the heavens would reside. (Daniel 4:21)
- It is you, 0 king, because you have grown great and become strong, and your grandeur has grown great and reached to the heavens, and your rulership to the extremity of the earth. (Daniel 4:22)
" And, look! All of it produced weeds. Nettles covered its very surface, and its stone wall itself had been torn down. (Proverbs 24:31)
- The plural form of the Hebrew term qim-mohs', which is commonly rendered, nettle, appears to denote weeds of all kinds.

- Another illustration he set before them, saying; The kingdom of the heavens has become like a man that sowed fine seed in his field. (Matthew 13:24)

- The Son of man will send forth his angels, and they will collect out from his kingdom all things that cause stumbling and persons who are doing lawlessness. (Matthew 13:41)
- And they will pitch them into the fiery furnace. There is where their weeping and the gnashing of their teeth will be. (Matthew 13:42)

- Are generally considered to be bearded darnel, Lolium temulentum, which very much resembles wheat until maturity, when it can be readily distinguished from wheat by its smaller black seeds.

- If darnel seeds become mixed with wheat kernels after the harvest, this can have a serious effect upon the eater. Dizziness and even fatal poisoning have been attributed to eating bread containing too much darnel flour. The poisonous properties of darnel seeds are generally believed to stem from a fungus growing within them
