And I hated life, because the work that has been done under the sun was calamitous from my standpoint, for everything was vanity and a striving after wind.

- For there exists the man whose hard work has been with wisdom and with knowledge and with proficiency, but to a man that has not worked hard at such a thing will be given the portion of that one. This too is vanity and a big calamity. (Ecclesiastes 2:21)
- And this too is a grave calamity; exactly as one has come, so one will go away, and what profit is there to the one who keeps working hard for the wind? (Ecclesiastes 5:16)
- And I, even I, turned toward all the works of mine that my hands had done and toward the hard work that I had worked hard to

accomplish, and, look! Everything was vanity and a striving after wind, and there was nothing of advantage under the sun. (Ecclesiastes 2:11)

And I congratulated the dead who had already died rather than the living who were still alive. (Ecclesiastes 4:2)
