

**Jeremiah 39:9** And the rest of the people who were left remaining in the city, and the deserters that had fallen away to him, and the rest of the people who were left remaining Nebuzaradan the chief of the bodyguard took into exile to Babylon.

- And in the fifth month, on the tenth day of the month, that is, in the nineteenth year of King Nebuchadnezzar, the king of **Babylon**, **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard**, who was standing before the king of **Babylon**, came into Jerusalem. (**Jeremiah 52:12**)
- And **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard** then **took** them and conducted them to the king of **Babylon** at Riblah. (**2 Kings 25:20**)
- The word that occurred to Jeremiah from Yehowah after **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard** sent him from Ramah, when he **took** him while he was bound with handcuffs in the midst of all the **exiles** of Jerusalem and of Judah, who were being taken into **exile** in **Babylon**. (**Jeremiah 40:1**)
- And the **rest** of the **people** that were **left** behind in the **city** and the **deserters** that had gone over to the king of **Babylon** and the **rest** of the crowd **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard** **took** into **exile**. (**2 Kings 25:11**)
- And in the fifth month on the seventh day of the month, that is to say, the nineteenth year of King Nebuchadnezzar the king of **Babylon**, **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard**, the servant of the king of **Babylon**, came to Jerusalem. (**2 Kings 25:8**)
- As for all Israelites, they were enrolled genealogically, and there they are written in the Book of the Kings of Israel. And Judah itself was taken into **exile** at **Babylon** for their unfaithfulness. (**1 Chronicles 9:1**)
- These are the sons of the jurisdictional district who came up out of the captivity of the exiled **people** whom Nebuchadnezzar the king of **Babylon** had taken into **exile** and who later returned to Jerusalem and to Judah, each to his own **city**. (**Nehemiah 7:6**)
- At that time Merodach-baladan the son of Baladan the king of **Babylon** sent letters and a gift to Hezekiah, after he heard that he had been sick but was strong again. (**Isaiah 39:1**)

- The cities of the south themselves have been shut up, so that there is no one opening them. Judah in its entirety has been taken into **exile**. It has been taken into **exile** completely. (**Jeremiah 13:19**)
- For this is what Yehowah has said; Here I am making you a fright to yourself and to all your lovers, and they will certainly fall by the sword of their enemies while your eyes will be looking on, and all Judah I shall give into the hand of the king of **Babylon**, and he will actually take them into **exile** in **Babylon** and strike them down with the sword. (**Jeremiah 20:4**)
- And some of the lowly ones of the **people** and the **rest** of the **people** that were **left remaining** in the **city** and the **deserters** that had **fallen away** to the king of **Babylon** and the **rest** of the master workmen **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard** took into **exile**. (**Jeremiah 52:15**)
- So these **Nebuzaradan** the **chief** of the **bodyguard** took and conducted them to the king of **Babylon** at Riblah. (**Jeremiah 52:26**)
- Judah has gone into **exile** because of the affliction and because of the abundance of servitude. She herself has had to dwell among the nations. No resting-place has she found. All those who were persecuting her have overtaken her among distressing circumstances. (**Lamentations 1:3**)
- Her adversaries have become the head. Those who are her enemies are unconcerned. Because Yehowah himself has brought grief to her on account of the abundance of her transgressions. Her own children have walked captive before the adversary. (**Lamentations 1:5**)
