Ezekiel 45:11.* As regards the ephah and the bath ${ }^{1}$ measure, there should come to be but one fixed amount, for the bath to carry a tenth of a homer ${ }^{2}$ and the tenth of the homer an ephah; ${ }^{3}$ with reference to the homer, its required amount should prove to be.
