1· So Jesus reasoned, that if Yehowah God had called gods, those against whom the scripture came, why were they so upset by what he said, for the scripture could not be nullified. Accordingly they were not taking all the facts into account.

[Question] How did Jesus then reason, with these men who opposed him?

2· God is stationing himself in the assembly of the Divine One, in the middle of the gods he judges. (Psalms 82:1)

[Question] What does the Psalms state, about where Yehowah God stations himself in judgment?

3· Do not think I came to destroy the Law or the Prophets. I came, not to destroy, but to fulfill. (Matthew 5:17)

[Question] Did Jesus Christ come to destroy the Law and the Prophets, or for what purpose?

4· Indeed, it is easier for heaven and earth to pass away, than for one particle of a letter of the Law to go unfulfilled. (Luke 16:17)

[Question] What did Jesus state would sooner pass away, than for one particle of the Law not to become fulfilled?

5· I myself have said; You are gods, and all of you are sons of the Most High. (Psalms 82:6)

[Question] What did the Psalms call mere men?

6· In the beginning, the Word was, and the Word was with God, and the Word was a god. (John 1:1)

[Question] What was the one, called the Word of God, in the beginning, and where was he, and who was he with?

7· For even though there are those who are called gods, whether in heaven or on earth, just as there are many gods and many lords. (1 Corinthians 8:5)

[Question] What did Paul show, that there are many of on earth?
