Ephesians 4:2~ With complete lowliness of mind and mildness, with long-suffering, putting up with one another in love.

1. Paul now shows them, how they should walk as anointed Christians within the wicked world all around them. They should have complete lowliness of mind, always acting and thinking like others were superior to them.

[Question] How does Paul then show them, that they must walk as anointed Christians?

2. They should always be mild in their dealings with other people, and especially their brothers in the faith. They must exercise long-suffering, by being willing to suffer in behalf of the preaching work, and accept opposition to it, from opposers.

[Question] How then, must they act toward their brothers, and to opposers?

3. They must always put up with the failings of their brothers in love, and not become offended, or grow apart from, or close off from themselves, those who share their faith in the Lord.

[Question] How must they always come to feel, and act toward their anointed Christians brothers?

4. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am mildtempered and lowly in heart, and you will find refreshment for your souls. (Matthew 11:29)

[Question] What yoke of service did Jesus Christ invite all to take up with him, and what kind of a yoke is it?

5' Slaving for the Lord with the greatest lowliness of mind, and tears and trials that befell me, by the plots of the Jews. (Acts of Apostles 20:19)

[Question] How did Paul slave for the Lord, Jesus Christ?

6. For through the undeserved kindness given to me I tell everyone there among you, not to think more of himself than it is necessary to think, but to think so as to have a sound mind, each one as God has distributed to him a measure of faith. (Romans 12:3)

[Question] How did Paul show, that they should come to think about themselves?

7. Doing nothing out of contentiousness or out of egotism, but with lowliness of mind, considering that the others are superior to you. (Philippians 2:3)

[Question] What should not be the driving force of our works toward one another?

[Question] What is proper motivation for our fine works?

8. In like manner, you younger men, be in subjection to the older men. But all of you gird yourselves with lowliness of mind toward one another, because God opposes the haughty ones, but he gives undeserved kindness to the humble ones. (1 Peter 5:5)

[Question] What should all men in the congregation gird themselves with, and why?

9. By purity, by knowledge, by long-suffering, by kindness, by Holy Spirit, by love free from hypocrisy. (2 Corinthians 6:6)

[Question] How did Paul exercise fine qualities to gain others to Christ?

10. On the other hand, we exhort you, brothers, admonish the disorderly, speak consolingly to the depressed souls, support the weak, be long-suffering toward all. (1 Thessalonians 5:14)

[Question] How does Paul encourage his anointed brothers to act toward others within the congregation?

11. Love is long-suffering and kind. Love is not jealous, it does not brag, does not get puffed up. (1 Corinthians 13:4)

[Question] How does love act within the congregation?

12. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted. (Matthew 23:12)

[Question] What will those who exalt themselves receive?

[Question] What will those who humble themselves receive?

13. Be minded the same way toward others as to yourselves,

do not be minding lofty things, but be led along with the lowly things. Do not become discreet in your own eyes. (Romans 12:16)

[Question] How should we think of others?

[Question] What things should we be led along by, and what should we not become, in our own view of ourselves?

14. Accordingly, as God's chosen ones, holy and loved, clothe yourselves with the tender affections of compassion, kindness, lowliness of mind, mildness, and long-suffering. (Colossians 3:12)

[Question] What should those who are holy and loved by God, clothe themselves with as qualities?

15. To speak injuriously of no one, not to be belligerent, to be reasonable, exhibiting all mildness toward all men. (Titus 3:2)

[Question] What way should we act toward all, always being reasonable?
